This is also the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Village of Yesteryear, an extremely popular exhibition of crafts people demonstrating and displaying their work.



## NORTH CAROLINA STATE FAIR HISTORY

The first State Fair was founded in October, 1853 by the State Agricultural Society. One of the earliest resolutions approved was that the Society sponsor a cattle show and an exhibition of domestic manufacturers. It was planned to offer premiums to farmers who developed better practices for crop improvement, or designed and built more effective implements. Immediately plans were underway toward the first State Fair to spread constructive agricultural information.

The site for the first fair was a 16-acre tract about 10 blocks east of the Capitol in Raleigh. In the *Raleigh Register*, the city's weekly newspaper, a week before the big event ". . . the entrance fee at the gate will be 25 cents for a single person, and \$1 for a carriage; and 50 cents for a buggy." The City of Raleigh contributed \$25.00 toward the fair and receipts amounted to \$3,000. Estimated attendance was four to six thousand. It was highly successful. An editorial appearing in the *Raleigh Register* Sunday morning October 22, 1853, allowed that:

"Nearly every section of the State, and every industrial pursuit within its borders, were represented. The East sent its fine staples and its blooded stock, the West its splendid cattle and its rich minerals. The farmer poured in his agricultural products, the mechanic brought forward splendid specimens of his skill, the native artist exhibited the productions of his pen or his pencil, and the ladies of the State, never behind in any good work or beneficent object crowned the excellence of the whole with the multiplied beauties which nature had yielded to their culture, and the varied and tasteful attractions which had sprung their handicraft."

The fair was moved in 1873 to what was then described as a "55 acre broom sage field comprising an eminence known as 'Cook's Hill on Hillsboro Road some 300 yards from the N.C. and Augusta Air Line Railroad, one and one-quarter miles west of the city limits of Raleigh." This is now a residential and business district across from the campus of N.C. State University. The Raleigh Little Theatre now occupies the site.

The Agricultural Society developed these grounds at a cost of more than \$50,000. The buildings consisted of a three-story octagon-shaped exhibit hall, 250 feet long and 44 feet deep. There were two wings designed as Farmers and Mechanics Halls. A 200 x 44 foot shed housed the machinery display and a three-story grandstand, judges' stand and one-half mile of railroad tracks completed the permanent structures. The offices and dressing rooms were on the first floor of the grandstand. The second deck was the spectators' area, and the third floor was called "Tete-a-Tete Hall" where one could enjoy a chair and privacy for an extra 25 cents.

By 1895 the Agricultural Society's show and exhibition had become the main annual event among rural Tar Heels.

Politics and reunions were a big part of the fair in 1903. Confederate veterans gathered at the fair and reminisced the big battles and hard times of '65 and '66.

President Theodore Roosevelt spoke to fairgoers in 1905 and was followed in 1907 by William Jennings Bryan. Speech-making was another major attraction of early fairs. Bryan, the famed "silver-tongued" orator, had already delivered his famous cross of gold speech and lost two elections. His address to North Carolinians undoubtedly was part of his third unsuccessful race for the presidency.

The Agricultural Society conducted the State Fair for 73 years. It was discontinued from 1860 through 1866 during the Civil War and Reconstruction period, and in 1918 during World War I and influenza epidemic. The fair yielded in 1884 to a month long "North Carolina Exposition" held on the fairgrounds.

In 1924 the society requested aid from the state and City of Raleigh. The first State Fair Board was appointed by Governor McLean in 1925 with representatives from the State, City and Agricultural Society. After this, the society disbanded. There was no State Fair in 1926 and 1927. The late Governor J. Melville Broughton succeeded in convincing the Legislature to designate 200 acres of land to the State Fair.

Thus, the State Fair moved in 1928 to its present site with additional land granted in 1952 .

The State Fair was placed under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture in 1930. The various committees continued to operate the fair until 1933 when the Board of Agriculture leased the fair to George Hamid for operation on a commercial basis.

The late Governor W. Kerr Scott returned the State Fair to the management of the Department of Agriculture in 1937 when he took office as Commissioner of Agriculture. That year in excess of \$12,000 was paid out in educational exhibitor premiums, and by 1948 this figure had reached more than \$70,000. Currently the figure exceeds \$240,000.

Dr. J.S. Dorton of Shelby was appointed manager of the new State Fair, Division of the Department of Agriculture, in 1937. Immediately the fair was no longer a burden and showed a profit of over \$8,000. The profits have increased yearly and have been turned back into improvements for buildings and grounds.

It was in 1948 when entertainment became a big part of the State Fair. James E. Strates Shows has been a regular feature since that time and during this same year Bascom Lamar Lunsford brought the first Folk Festival, a feature that is still going strong.

The N.C. General Assembly approved funds in the late 40's for construction of a year-round facility to serve agriculture, industry, commerce and the general welfare of the state. This center for educational, inspirational and recreational events was completed in 1952 and named the J.S. Dorton Arena. The arena's unique architectural design won it acclaim as one of the significant structures of recent times.

Dr. Dorton died in 1961 and state Agriculture Commissioner L.Y. Ballentine assumed his duties until his death in 1964. It was in 1961 that the fair operated six days for the first time. Robert W. Shoffner, an assistant manager of the fair from 1947 to 1960 was appointed by James A. Graham to complete production of the '64 fair. Arthur K. Pitzer was named permanent manager in January, 1965 by Commissioner Graham. In 1968 the Board of Agriculture approved extending the fair's length to nine days beginning in 1969. This set the stage for the 1970's, which was to be a decade of significant growth.

Four new structures were completed: The Gov. W. Kerr Scott Building (1972); Gov. James E. Holshouser, Jr. Building (1974); Jim Graham Building (1975); Forestry Resources Center (1976); and Gov. James B. Hunt, Jr. Horse Complex (1983). An ambitious grounds improvement program of landscaping, paving, curbing and guttering was implemented. Work was also begun on Heritage Circle, an area near the fairgrounds lake set aside to highlight cultural history of the state. One of the first Heritage Circle projects was an authentic 18th century school house donated in 1975. The 1978 North Carolina Legislature authorized funds used by the fair to purchase an additional 144 acres of land adjacent to the grounds. The acquisition brought the fairgrounds to 344 total acres.

A program of popular special exhibits was inaugurated. In 1972 the fair sponsored the world's largest space-related educational exhibit which was viewed by an estimated 250,000 people. A series of exhibits highlighting different N.C. field commodities each year stirred new interest and pride in the state's agricultural tradition, particularly among the non-farming public. Several programs motivated in part by economic concerns of fairgoers were also initiated. In 1970 senior citizens were admitted to the fair free of charge. The same year the Century Farm Families program was launched. In 1974 a package of free indoor entertainment by major performers was first offered and quickly became one of the Fair's most popular and

successful features. A year later a program was initiated offering advance discounts for ride costs and gate admission.

Efforts to speak to the wishes of the fairgoers paid off handsomely at the gate. Attendance averaged 570,000 in the 1970's, 670,000 in the 1980's, 700,000 in the 1990's, and peaked at 846,724 in 2000. President Gerald R. Ford in 1976 and President George Herbert Walker Bush in 1992 campaigned at the Fair, addressing fair patrons on both occasions.

In 1983, Sam G. Rand was named fair manager succeeding Art Pitzer who retired. A new horse facility (Gov. James B. Hunt, Jr. Horse Complex) was opened, housing up to 500 head of horses.

During the years 1984-1993, the following improvements were made: new restroom facilities at Gate 8 and at the Grandstand; underground electrical distribution system installed; new handicapped restrooms in Dorton Arena; new roofs on Scott Building, Graham Building, Dorton Arena, Holshouser Building, and Education & Commercial Buildings; new roof and seats in Grandstand; remodeled Hobby & Crafts Building; paved midway area and other parking lots; new outdoor public address system; additions to storm drainage system; landscaping around Scott Building, Holshouser Building, and Education & Commercial Buildings; new box seats in Hunt Horse Complex and new offices and restaurant addition to Hunt Horse Complex. Renovation of Sam G. Rand Grandstand racetrack to include harness racing; and demolished Industrial and Poultry Buildings.

On September 14, 1996, President William J. Clinton visited the fairgrounds to address the National Guard, Federal Emergency Management Agency, and Department of Transportation workers who were using the fairgrounds as an emergency staging area to clean up the disaster caused by Hurricane Fran.

In 1997, Wesley V. Wyatt was named Fair Manager following the death of Sam Rand.

The fair celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Folk Festival in 1998, and invited back many of the winners of the Bascom Lamar Lunsford Trophy for encore performances at the Folk Festival. The Strates Shows celebrated their 50th anniversary at the N.C. State Fair.

Attendance, almost perfect weather, and special celebrations made 2000 a record year for the N.C. State Fair. The State Fair posted record attendance with 846,724 attendees passing through the gates during the 10-day period. More than 2.3 million visitors attended 369 events at the fairgrounds during the year. The State Fairgrounds operates on a year-round basis and are enterprise funded, receiving no appropriated monies except for large capital improvements. There are 50 permanent employees.

\$1.5 million dollars in renovations and improvements to the Education & Commercial Buildings were completed in early 1999. Additional renovations were made at the L.R. Harrill Center dining hall and dormitories. A paving project covered many of the dirt roads between the barns at the Hunt Horse Complex, and restrooms in those stall buildings were renovated as well. Major renovations were done to the Graham Building and improvements to the Hunt Horse Complex took place in 1999 and 2000. A program of grounds improvements to the Flower Show area, Grist Mill and paving a 250 car handicapped parking lot took place at that time as well.

A landmark for past generations of fair visitors, the Helen Ida Kirk Graham Waterfall, was dedicated on October 14, 1999.

Commissioner Jim Graham retired at the expiration of his term in January 2001. Meg Scott Phipps was sworn in as the 13th Commissioner of Agriculture since 1877. The Department of Agriculture was formed by the General Assembly of 1876-1877.

## **INFORMATION AND GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITORS AND PATRONS**

Exhibitors and patrons are sincerely requested to make constructive criticisms and offer helpful suggestions toward bettering any part or department of this, YOUR STATE FAIR.

Please report any discourtesies by gatemen, concessionaires, showmen, or others connected with the Fair. If, for any reason, there is a misunderstanding about admission at gates or elsewhere, please pay the admission price asked, take a receipt for same, and come directly to the Manager's office. Please do not block traffic and delay others by prolonged arguments with ticket-sellers, gatemen and ticket-takers who are working on strict orders from the management and are not allowed to vary from them.

Concessions and attractions are granted privileges on the grounds to supply the necessary wants, comforts, conveniences and pleasures of the patrons. The management will not accept or knowingly allow the continuance of any concession, show or other attractions of a questionable nature or a demoralizing tendency nor will any concession be permitted where the business is conducted in other than a legitimate and legal manner.

Drunkness, quarreling, or the use of profane or obscene language will not be allowed on the grounds. No begging will be permitted.

No peddling, hawking, or selling of any kind will be allowed in the buildings or on the grounds except by special license obtained from the Manager.

All dining halls, lunch stands, refreshment booths, and other places dispensing food and beverage must be substantial in structure and neat in appearance. They must meet all health regulations and must sell only good, wholesome food and pure honest goods at reasonable prices which must be approved by the Fair management and displayed in a prominent place. No soft drinks may be sold in bottles.

Parties owning buildings upon the State Fair grounds must notify the manager thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the Fair as to whether they desire to occupy the same or not, and if so, make arrangements with the superintendent of the department for such occupancy. Failure to comply with the provisions of this rule will cause the forfeiture of the use of such building or buildings by the Fair management.

Any party or parties, firm or corporation owning buildings or material upon the State Fairgrounds, without lease, or whose lease has expired, who shall fail to remove same upon order of the Manager within the time specified, shall forfeit all claim thereto, which expense of claim must be paid before material is released to the owner.

The management of the State Fair reserves the right to amend, add to and interpret the foregoing and following Rules and Regulations, and to arbitrarily settle and determine all questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Fair. In the event of conflict between the General Rules and the special rules which appear as headnotes of the various divisions and departments of the Fair, the latter will take precedence.

Disregard of any rule, misrepresentation on the part of the exhibitor, concessionaire or patrons will forfeit all premiums won, privileges granted, fees paid, and rights to further participation in the Fair.

## **ENTRIES**

**MAKE ALL ENTRIES EARLY!!!** The right is reserved to reject any entry and all entries received after all space is taken must be rejected.

You will find the **CLOSING DATES FOR ENTRIES** set out in the Rules and Regulations and the general headings of each of the various departments. These dates **VARY WITH THE SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS OF THE SPECIFIC DEPARTMENT.**

Check these Closing Dates carefully.

SEPARATE ENTRY BLANKS are required for entries in each of the departments. Request the Entry Department supply you with an adequate number of entry blanks.

Competition is OPEN TO THE WORLD in the Flower and Garden Show, Folk Festival, Rabbit Department, Poultry Department, Goats, Dairy Cattle Department, Beef Cattle Breeding Animal Department, in the Swine and Sheep Departments and the Horse Show.

In all other divisions and departments competition is LIMITED TO RESIDENTS OF NORTH CAROLINA.

All entries (with exceptions noted in the Livestock Division for group classes) must be made in the name of the owner, breeder, manufacturer, grower, producer, or one whose skill the exhibit represents. A firm, to be entitled to exhibit as such, must have been organized not less than 30 days prior to the closing date for entries, and such firm must have been organized as a bona fide firm for the purpose of producing, or buying and selling the articles or animals it proposes to exhibit in the name of such firm. A firm will be regarded as one exhibitor.

Official printed forms or copies of this form MUST BE USED in making applications for entry.

One can be found in the back of the book. USE A SEPARATE FORM FOR ENTRIES IN EACH DEPARTMENT. *Be sure to fill out the application form completely, accurately and legibly. Give your rural route number, post office box number, or city street address and zip code, telephone number and social security number.*

Additional application forms are available upon request to: N.C. STATE FAIR, 1025 BLUE RIDGE BLVD., RALEIGH, N.C. 27607.

Incomplete entry forms will be returned for correction if there is time to do so, but REMEMBER: No article or animals will be entitled to exhibition space until proper entry has been made. No entry will be accepted after the closing date listed for each department.

Once an entry is made, it cannot be changed except where it is improperly classed or a mistake has been made in copying the original entry—in which event the changes can be made only with the permission of the Department Superintendent, or Director in charge, AND THEN ONLY IN THE OFFICE OF THE "ENTRY SUPERINTENDENT." If the records are altered and do not conform with the information on file in the Entry Department, payment of premiums will be withheld.

No person except personnel of the Entry Department will be allowed to see the entries, or have access to the entry books, until after the awards are made.

The same article or animal cannot be entered for more than one premium number (except as otherwise stated in the Special Department Rules and Regulations). Collections and displays must be made up of specimens, other than those entered in single (individual) classes unless otherwise noted.

Except for the Horse Show no entry fees are required in any department, except that livestock, poultry, and rabbit exhibitors must include payment of stall, pen, and coop fees with their applications for entry. (SEE HEAD-NOTES OF THESE DEPARTMENTS FOR SCALE OR FEES.) SEE DEPT. H, Arts and Photography head-notes for entry fees in the professional and amateur categories.

Application forms for entry should be mailed to: N.C. STATE FAIR, 1025 Blue Ridge Blvd., Raleigh, N.C. Effective Wednesday, October 3, 2001 the Entry Department will be staffed to receive applications for entry in person.

Entry Department will be open from Wednesday, October 3, 2001–Friday, November 2, 2001, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

## EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS

The dates on which your exhibits must be in place at State Fair VARY FROM ONE DEPARTMENT TO ANOTHER. These dates are set out in the Department Headings and Rules and Regulations. Check these dates carefully so you can get your exhibits IN PLACE AT THE PROPER TIME TO BE JUDGED.

UNCLAIMED EXHIBITS FROM COMPETITIVE DEPARTMENTS, will be considered abandoned if not called for within one week after the official closing of the Fair, and may be disposed of as the Manager of the Fair sees fit. SEE SPECIAL RULES for the Culinary and Horticulture Departments.

Remember! All exhibits must be officially entered in the Fair on official printed forms provided for that purpose, before the closing date for entries in the department. No article or animal will be entitled to space or considered in the judging until proper entry has been made. Removal of exhibits before the date and time specified will be cause for forfeit of all premiums won, all fees paid, and the right to further participation in the Fair.

In all but livestock departments, entries and exhibits will remain in place through the entire fair. Release times are scheduled for the day following the fair due to the lack of parking available nearby for those to pick up entries or exhibits, and in an effort to keep vehicles off the grounds during crowded conditions. The regulation will also assure those attending the fair during the evening of the final day of seeing the same exhibits and entries as those attending earlier.

All exhibits will be numbered and recorded in the books of the proper department and class and exhibit tag with corresponding numbers will be issued. This tag must be securely attached to the exhibit and must remain on the exhibit throughout the Fair (except that exhibit tags issued for livestock and poultry may be conspicuously displayed upon the stall, pen or coop). ENTRY TAGS WILL NOT BE MAILED but will be available, at the Entry Department, Administration Building.

Once the exhibit is numbered and tagged, it should be delivered to the Department Superintendent or Director who will allocate space and either personally arrange the exhibit in a suitable and attractive display or direct such action by the exhibitor. The State Fair assumes no responsibility for the incorrect tagging of exhibits.

All exhibitors are urged to personally bring their exhibits to the Fair and enjoy the educational and recreational advantages of the annual exposition. However exhibits may be shipped or mailed to: N.C. STATE FAIR, 1025 BLUE RIDGE BLVD., RALEIGH, N.C. 27607, and they will be carefully handled, officially entered, tagged, and otherwise treated in the same manner as previously described. They will be given the same consideration with regard to display and judging as exhibits personally delivered.

All exhibits shipped or mailed MUST BE PREPAID. No transportation charges for express, postage, freight or drayage will be paid by the Fair. Shipments should be carefully labeled, accompanied by a bill of lading, and properly identified inside and outside the package as to the department, class and premium number under which they have been previously entered. They should be shipped or mailed at least a week or 10 days prior to the opening of the Fair. The management will not be responsible for delayed shipments which arrive at the Fair too late to be considered in the judging.

Division Directors and Department Superintendents will have full authority over allocation of space, and will have direct supervision of all exhibits which are considered on exhibition as a part of the Fair's attractions, subject to use as these Directors and Superintendents see fit to add to the educational values of the Fair. Livestock able to be led or driven, or which will follow, must participate in parades and group exhibitions as directed by the Department Superintendent.

All livestock must be cared for by the exhibitor except as noted in the Junior Dairy Cattle and Market Cattle shows. Stalls and pens will be furnished bedding before

the Fair free of charge. Thereafter exhibitors will be required to furnish their own bedding and keep all stalls and pens clean. Feed and straw will be sold on the grounds at prevailing prices.

When exhibit tags are issued by the Entry Department for each article entered, a stub with a duplicate number will be given the exhibitor to serve as his claim check to recover and secure the release of his exhibit. Claim checks should be guarded carefully, since Department Superintendents and Directors are not allowed to release any exhibit without presentation of the exhibit tag stub. If the claim check is lost, such loss should be reported promptly and it will be necessary for the exhibitor to furnish the Superintendent of the Entry Department proof of ownership of the article on exhibit.

Exhibits entered in the premium classes which are not claimed within one week after the close of the Fair will be considered to have been abandoned by the exhibitor and will be disposed of as the Manager of the Fair sees fit. Other exhibits, materials therein, including concession booths, which are not claimed by the exhibitor or concessionaire within 30 days after the end of the Fair will be considered to have been abandoned and will become the property of the State Fair.

The Fair management reserves the right to reject any exhibit which does not reflect merit and which would not be a credit to both the exhibitor and the Fair. Also, the right is reserved to reject exhibits which are deemed objectionable or unsuitable for exhibition. All entries are accepted conditionally pending inspection of the article or animal to be exhibited. Any article or animal which proves to be misrepresented or falsely classed will be rejected and the right of the exhibitor to further participation in the Fair will be denied.

Division Directors, Department Superintendents, and/or Judges must report disqualification of entries to the Manager of the State Fair immediately after such action is taken. **UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL JUDGING BE CONSIDERED OFFICIAL AND PREMIUMS PAID IN A CLASS WHERE DISQUALIFICATION IS RECOMMENDED UNTIL APPROVAL OF THE DISQUALIFICATION(S) IS OBTAINED FROM THE FAIR MANAGER.**

Promiscuous advertising is strictly prohibited. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute literature and free samples from their place of exhibit only, but may not sell any article or animal from their exhibit space without a permit from the manager. The distribution of advertising matter which conflicts in any manner with a concession sold by the Management is prohibited.

Commercial exhibitors and concessionaires are responsible for keeping the space in and around their exhibits, including unused space, aisles and roadways, clean and free of rubbish. An area of 10 feet around each exhibit booth and concession stand must be thoroughly cleaned by the exhibitor or concessionaire at the end of each Fair day. Failure to do so will be cause for cancellation of contract.

No exhibit space assigned may be shared or sublet without permission of the Fair manager.

### **JUDGING AND AWARDS**

Decision of the judges will be final, and no appeal will be considered except in cases of protest in writing, with strong evidence of fraud or violation of the rules of the Fair. Protests must be filed with the Division Superintendent not later than noon of the day following the award, and must be accompanied by a protest fee of \$5.00 which will be retained by the Fair if the protest is not sustained. The protest must be filed no later than 3 days following the award. The Division Superintendent will appoint a committee to consider the protest and all interested parties will be notified of the time of the hearing and will be given an opportunity to be heard. The rules of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions governing appeals will be those of the North Carolina Fair.

Judges will not award premiums to any article or animal because of its mere presence. It must be individual worthy. It is not the policy of the Fair to encourage indifferent production of any kind, or to distribute premiums equally among exhibitors. No premium will be awarded to any exhibit that does not possess high intrinsic merit.

Unless otherwise specified in the Department Rules and Regulations, NO EXHIBITOR MAY WIN MORE THAN TWO PREMIUMS IN ANY ONE INDIVIDUAL CLASS, AND NOT MORE THAN ONE PREMIUM IN ANY GROUP CLASS.

No exhibitor may accompany judges during their deliberations except such attendants as are necessary to handle and show livestock and other such exhibits. Any exhibitor attempting to interfere with the judges during their adjudications, or who publicly expresses disapproval of the decision of the judges, will be excluded from further competition and any premiums previously won will be forfeited.

Fraud or deception as to breeding, or in any other form, will be exposed and exhibitor guilty of such violation will be excluded from further participation in the Fair and all premiums previously won will be forfeited.

Premiums will be paid only on the basis of the records of the judging reports, which will be signed by the judge and by the Department Superintendent or Director. Ribbons will be securely attached to the articles upon which they were awarded, if possible, but the ribbons have no value in the payment of premiums since they may become detached and find their way on to the wrong exhibit.

Entries made in wrong classes may be reclassified by the Department Superintendent, BUT ONLY IF SUCH RECLASSIFICATION IS MADE IN THE OFFICE OF, AND WITH THE APPROVAL OF, THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE ENTRY DEPARTMENT. Records must be changed when entries are reclassified. If the records are altered and the entry department files are not changed, premiums will be withheld.

Judges, when requested, may give the reasons for their decisions embracing the value and desirable qualities of the exhibits to which they have awarded premiums.

Judges will not award premiums or ribbons to any article or animal that does not qualify for one of the classes in the State Fair Premium List.

Premiums will be paid to winning exhibitors as soon after the awards are made as it is possible to compile and check all reports. Premiums not collected during the Fair will be mailed to the exhibitor at the post office address given on his or her entry form. Errors in premium statements will be corrected until December 1, 2001 after which time the books of the 2001 Fair are closed.

**COMPETITION:** Only federally bonded wineries holding North Carolina commercial winery permits are eligible to enter Commercial competition. There is no limit to the number of wines a winery may enter.

**ENTRIES CLOSE:** September 18, 2001

**EXHIBITS MUST BE RECEIVED:** wines, entry form, and entry fee must arrive between September 1 and September 18, 2001. **Ship to:** Tania Dautlick NC Grape Council, NC DA&CS, 2 West Edenton Street, Raleigh, NC 27601

**JUDGING STARTS:** Monday, October 15, 2001 and will take place in the Jim Graham Building, North Carolina State Fairgrounds

Wine bottles submitted for competition will not be returned to exhibitors. Medal and ribbon winning wines will be displayed in the Education Building during the fair. Unopened bottles will be used at the discretion of the Superintendents for educational and promotion purposes.

**AWARDS:** Medals will be awarded in the Commercial competition for *Gold*, *Silver* and *Bronze*, and certificates for *Honorable Mention* in each category. In addition, awards for *Best of Show-Red* and *Best of Show-White* will be awarded. Medals will be awarded based on the merit of each wine. Wines will not be judged against one another, but against the standard for each style and variety. There is no limit to the number of medals that may be awarded in each category. Ribbons and premiums will be awarded in the Amateur competition.

**RESULTS:** Exhibitors will be notified by mail of competition results.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The general Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department, except in cases of conflict, where the following Rules and Regulations will prevail. Be sure to read the rules in front of this book before entering or competing in this department.
2. Only federally-bonded and NC ABC-permitted North Carolina Wineries may enter the commercial wine competition.
3. **MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!** The right is reserved to reject entries received after the deadline, without entry forms, or without proper fees enclosed.
4. Commercial and Amateur entries must be submitted on separate entry forms.
5. Each wine entered must be listed on the entry form, which must accompany the wines.
6. Varieties of grapes and percentages used in each wine must be listed, and residual sugar of each wine must be listed on the entry form.
7. Four (4) bottles of each wine must be submitted for the Commercial Wine competition. One (1) bottle of each wine must be submitted for the Amateur Wine competition. Excess wine will not be returned.

### JUDGING

A three to six-member panel of professional judges from several states on the East Coast will judge the wines. Number of judges per panel will depend on total number of wines entered. Wines will be judged blind; judges will not see the wine bottle, nor will they receive any indication of which exhibitor entered the wine.

Wines will be classified into logical categories, based upon the number of wines received within each category. Wines will be further classified into table or dessert based on residual sugar and sparkling.

**PARTICIPATION:** Any hay producer in North Carolina.

**ENTRIES:** Deadline is Friday, September 21. Two forms must be completed and sent in at this time:

- 1) Official entry form from State Fair Catalog with social security number (these may be obtained from your local county agricultural extension office or from the N.C. State Fair at 919-821-7400).
- 2) Forage Analysis Sheet. A chemical analysis must be submitted for all entries. A check for \$10.00 along with a sample of your entry must be sent to NCDA's Forage Testing Lab. ## SAMPLES:

HAY — Samples will consist of a **6 inch "block" of hay** taken from an actual bale and tied with baler twine. Hand cut samples will be disqualified. Hay must be at or below safe storage moisture level (less than 20%). Uncured hay will be disqualified. All 6" blocks of hay should have core sampler entry/exit holes as evidence of sampling for chemical analysis.

Samples should be taken to the N.C. State Fairgrounds Entry Dept. to obtain an official entry tag and then the samples should be taken to the Graham Building on Wednesday, October 10. Since display space is limited, only the first six places in each class will be displayed.

JUDGING: Premiums will be awarded based on visual criteria and chemical analysis that are indicative of relative feed value. Scores will consist of a 'weighted' point system derived from 1/3 visual appraisal and 2/3 chemical analysis.

*NOTE: All entries will be retained for teaching purposes at North Carolina State University.*

**NEW>Please notice new entry form available on page 55**

To enter the show: (1) Read all rules for Department E; (2) Complete an entry form, found on page 63 of the NC State Fair Premium Book; (3) Send or bring the entry form to the Fair; and (4) Submit your entry for competition to the Flower and Garden Show. **THERE IS NO ENTRY FEE.** If you submit your completed entry form early, you will spend less time at the Fairgrounds when you bring in your entry.

Entries for Division V, Gardens, are closed for the 2001 show, since gardeners may begin cultivation as of June 1, 2001. Those who would like to participate in the Gardens competition during the 2002 State Fair Flower and Garden Show should contact the N.C. State Fair Entry Department (at the address below) by March 1, 2002. Provide your name, address, and daytime telephone number to receive information and the application form.

- ◆ You can MAIL your entry form: NC State Fair, 1025 Blue Ridge Blvd., Raleigh, NC 27607. Forms must be postmarked by October 1. Tags with your exhibitor number will be ready for pickup when you bring your entry.
- ◆ You can BRING in your entry form to the Flower House, State Fairgrounds, October 8-11. Entry clerks will be present to assist.
- ◆ You can BRING your entry form at the same time you bring your entry; however, your completed entry form must be submitted by 1:00 p.m. on the day of judging. Your entry will be processed, but this takes time and in most cases you will need to add plant name to complete the entry tag—particularly in classes of "any" or "other" plants unlisted.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THERE ARE SIX SEPARATE DIVISIONS. Entries for each division should be listed on a SEPARATE entry form for each division. List all cut specimens you expect to have; it is easier to delete entries that do not measure up than to enter at the last minute.

Most entries will be submitted for the First Show, including all of Divisions I and V. All of Division II is in the Second Show, and all of Division III is in the Third Show. Groups in Divisions IV and VI are included in each of the three shows. Entries in Division I, Sections 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 must be submitted by 3:00 p.m. October 11. Entry forms are due by 1:00 p.m. on the same day.

At the time of the Fair, you must bring your entries to the Flower House on the date and by the times specified below. The Flower House is located on the west side of the Fairgrounds. Enter Gate 6 from Youth Center Road. You will be permitted to drive into the grounds ONLY to unload entries. If requested, please show your entry form at the gate. No container-grown plants will be accepted before October 8.

**At the point your "entry" is properly tagged and submitted to the Flower and Garden Show for display, it becomes an "exhibit".**

### **FIRST SHOW**

**Entries to be submitted to the Flower House between 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. October 8-11. Entry forms must be received by 1 p.m. October 11, including Gardens. All exhibits must be submitted by 3 p.m. October 11.** Sections 3-7, Division I are designated a 10 day horticulture show.

### **SECOND SHOW**

**Entries to be submitted to the Flower House between 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. October 15. Entry forms must be received by 1 p.m. October 15. All exhibits must be submitted by 3 p.m. October 15.** No container-grown plants may be entered.

### **THIRD SHOW**

**Entries to be submitted to the Flower House between 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. October 18. Entry forms must be received by 1 p.m. October 18. All exhibits must be submitted by 3 p.m. October 18.** No container-grown plants may be entered.

### **JUDGING OF EXHIBITS**

First Show - Thursday, October 11 (Includes horticulture show and gardens)

Second Show - Monday, October 15-Flower House closes at 5:30 p.m. for judging

Third Show - Thursday, October 18-Flower House closes at 5:30 p.m. for judging

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

The general rules and regulations are listed in the front of the premium book. Specific rules for the Flower and Garden Show are listed below. In cases of conflict, the following rules and regulations will prevail:

All horticultural specimens must be clearly labeled with correct names. Indicate plant names and variety on the last line of entry label. Exhibits without a correct name will not be eligible for Award of Merit or Arboreal Award. Design/arrangement classes do not require such labeling.

**All entries must be the work of the exhibitor.  
No artificial flowers, foliage, or fruit are allowed in any class.**

All plant materials in Divisions I, II, III, and IV must have been grown by the exhibitor except for those used in designs.

In design classes a minimum of dyed, painted, varnished and otherwise treated material is permitted except in classes where all fresh plant materials are required. No fresh plant material is to be treated in any way (e.g. with vegetable oil or leaf shine). Neither cut fruit (e.g. sliced or peeled), nor cut vegetables, nor prepared foods are permitted. NO background is allowed.

Each exhibitor may make only one entry in each class and no entry may be entered under more than one class. However, each exhibitor may enter as many classes as are desired. Classes may be subdivided at the discretion of the Flower Show Director.

Designs are limited to 2 units or less. A sturdy base is recommended. Designs must be completed and tagged before submission to classification as an exhibit. Exhibitors may place their designs, under supervision of a Flower Show official, but the design may be moved.

Horticultural specimens should be exhibited in containers provided by the Flower and Garden Show. Exhibitors' containers, if used, will not be returned.

Exhibits may not exceed maximum dimensions listed below for specific classes (e.g. 30" for cut flowers, 48" for Pampas grass plumes).

Maximum dimensions for Division I, II, and III, Section 2

Designs/Arrangements are as follows:

Group 1 - 36" tall x 28" wide x 18" deep

Group 2 - 40" tall x 28" wide x 18" deep

Group 3 - 36" tall x 28" wide x 18" deep

Group 4 - maximum 8" in any dimension

Group 5 - maximum 5" in any dimension

Wreaths are permitted only where specified, and must be ready to hang.

Only exhibits in Division I, Section 6 may exceed 35 lbs., including container. Any other exhibits over 35 lbs. will be disqualified.

Dish gardens exhibited in Division I may not exceed maximum size of 24" high by 36" wide by 20" deep. Any larger exhibit will be disqualified. Any container-grown plant exhibited in Section 4 must have been grown by exhibitor and established in its container for at least 3 months. Exhibitors of container-grown plants must provide a saucer to retain moisture. Plant and container may not exceed 48" in height or 36" in width. Hanging and mounted plants are permitted in Groups 1 and 4, but NOT in any other Section 4 group except for "Pothos or Syngonium" class.

All exhibits will be under the supervision and care of the Show Director. Every effort will be made to prevent theft or damage, but the NC State Fair, the Gardeners of Wake County and the Show Director assume NO RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE LOSS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY OF THE EXHIBITORS.

Any horticultural exhibit determined by the Flower Show Director to be a hazard to other horticultural exhibits owing to obvious insect infestation will be disqualified and removed. Unightly exhibits will be removed at the discretion of the Show Director. Dead flowers will be discarded within each show. Only designs, containers and attached ribbons may be claimed October 15 and 18. Except for cut specimens, all other exhibits must be claimed October 22 between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Premiums will be paid only from the judges' books and not from the ribbons or tags on the exhibits. Premium checks will be distributed at the Flower Show building on Monday, October 22. Those not picked up at that time will be mailed. For exception, see Division V, Gardens. Participation ribbons will be awarded to all Division IV exhibits not awarded premiums.

ANY EXHIBIT NOT CLAIMED AND REMOVED FROM THE FLOWER SHOW GROUNDS BY 5:00 p.m. October 22 will become the property of the Gardeners of Wake County.

No vehicles will be allowed on the flower show grounds before 10:00 a.m. October 22.

#### **RULES SPECIFIC TO YOUTH EXHIBITS, DIVISION IV**

Exhibit must be the work of the exhibitor. Provide age of exhibitor on back of entry tag. For craft items, exhibitors may attach a short description or title on a 3"x5" card.

#### **RULES SPECIFIC TO THE GARDENS, DIVISION V**

Gardens may be worked any time after June 1, and must be completed by 1:00 p.m. Thursday, October 11.

The gardens are to be educational as well as artistic and should be functional for the purpose designed. The physical features should serve the purpose intended; eg., walks should have a destination or disappear with the illusion of a destination.

Indoor gardens should place emphasis on the use of plant materials.

Correct common name of plants must be provided. Botanical names should also be included. No artificial material is allowed.

All exhibitors must install at least two spotlights in each garden for night lighting.

**NEW>**A 24"x24" plot plan board will be provided. Information to be put on this board must include and is limited to the following: garden theme, name of exhibitor, plot plan, list of plants and exhibitors entry tag. The exhibitor's name is to be masked from the judges view prior to judging. Failure to do so will result in disqualification. Masking will be removed after judging is completed.

An appropriate sign may be used to acknowledge suppliers or donors only. The sign is to be placed in the garden after judging and in a manner not distracting to the garden. **NO** signs are to be mounted on the fence(s). Any sign deemed distracting and/or inappropriate by the Garden Chairman and/or Show Director will be removed.

Exhibitor must clean, water and replace dead materials in the garden daily. Pumps, fountains and lights are to be maintained in working order.

No exhibitor may enter the grounds for garden clean-out before 10:00 a.m. Monday, October 22.

Removal of garden exhibit materials must be completed by 5:00 p.m. Sunday, October 28.

Premium checks will not be awarded until the garden plot is cleaned out. All bark and soil amendment materials are to be removed from contact with the fences and the remaining ground leveled.

**NEW>**Exhibitors whose gardens are cleared on Monday, October 22 will receive their premium checks that day. Checks will be mailed Monday, October 29 to exhibitors whose gardens are cleared during the remainder of the clean-out period (October 23-28).

Failure to comply with the above rules and those listed in the General Rules for

Exhibitors in the Fair premium book could result in forfeiture of the premium check.

## JUDGING

All judging will be based on the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. standard system of judging. Only one first place (blue) ribbon per class or sub-class, only one second place (red) ribbon per class or sub-class, and only one third place (white) ribbon per class or sub-class will be awarded.

**JUDGING STARTS:** Friday, October 12, 2001, at 8:30 a.m.

**RELEASE OF EXHIBITS:** Monday, October 22, 8 a.m.-1:00 p.m., and **NOT BEFORE EXHIBITS** (except apples - see Special Note below) unclaimed by 1:00 P.M., October 22 will be considered abandoned and the fair will not be responsible for them after that time.

## **SPECIAL NOTE TO APPLE GROWERS!!**

Because of the extended duration of the N.C. State Fair it is assumed that most, if not all, apples will be out of condition by the end of the Fair. The Superintendent in charge of the fruit exhibit shall determine the method of distribution and any money received from the salvage of the apple exhibit will be divided according to the volume sold from each county exhibit and that amount will be sent to the respective county 4-H fund for use in 4-H work involving apples.

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Except in cases of conflict, in which event the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. **BE SURE TO READ THESE IN FRONT OF THIS BOOK BEFORE ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT.** Some - but not all- are repeated herewith for emphasis, and others apply only to this department.

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!** The right is reserved to **REJECT ENTRIES** not properly entered. All entries will be judged, but not all entries will be displayed if space becomes limited. Official printed forms must be used in making application for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use SEPARATE FORMS for entries in EACH CLASS - "1" Fruits and Nuts, and "2" Vegetables, of this department, and separate forms for entries in each other department of the Fair. Be sure to fill in the application form completely, accurately, and legibly. Give your rural route number, post office box number, or city street address, zip code, and social security number.

List the Department Letter "G" for Horticulture and the Class Number "1" for

Fruits and Nuts, and "2" for Vegetables, for which each entry is made. Also, list the premium number and the description of the article, exactly as shown in the Premium List.

Entry Tags should be picked up at the Entry Department immediately upon arrival on the Fairground, an Entry Tag must be attached to each exhibit before it is presented in the Department for display. Variety names are to be written on the backs of the tags.

As far as possible, it is urged that all horticulture products be brought in and prepared for exhibit by the exhibitor. Where it is not possible, **shipments** should be made in time to reach the Fairground no later than Wednesday, October 11, and should be addressed to: Superintendent, Horticulture Department, N.C. State Fair, 1025 Blue Ridge Blvd., Raleigh, N.C. 27607.

Where it is not possible to personally bring the products to the Fair and arrange them, Superintendents will be glad to arrange the products in the most attractive manner possible. However, they will not pack, plate, box or basket entries for exhibit. Exhibits mailed or shipped to the Fair should be carefully labeled to show the name and address of the exhibitor, and the nature, and class in which entered, and the contents of the package.

The State Fair will furnish PLATES, TRAYS AND BOXES for exhibits, but no other containers. The number of specimens for each PLATE display is specified in the premium list. *Standard size tray, 11 1/2 x 18 inches inside measurements, and 3 inches deep, will be used. Exhibitors should make a tray of the required dimensions and pack the exhibit to determine the number of specimens required.* At least one extra specimen for each plate, and three or four extra specimens for each tray, should be brought or shipped to the Fair to allow for possible damage in transit. To insure uniformity in exhibit material and to facilitate judging, the following sizes for apple varieties will be recognized. This list is not exclusive. The Superintendent may add or delete varieties in order to maintain the overall quality of products on display.

Fruits and vegetables to be exhibited in plates and trays should be carefully wrapped and packed for shipment to the Fair. Wrap separately in paper and pack firmly in a box, taking care to avoid bruising. Label each variety plainly and put in dividers to keep varieties separated. Do not use hay, fodder, excelsior or any other dusty packing material. **Any exhibit that rots, is unsightly or becomes unsightly** will be removed from display (after judging) at the discretion of the superintendent.

## QUALITY - NOT QUANTITY

In selecting horticultural products for exhibit, choose only those specimens that are of uniformly good quality, form and color, true to type, and free from all insect and disease blemishes, and free from cuts and bruises. Premiums offered for the best collection of fruits or vegetables will be awarded MAINLY ON THE BASIS OF QUALITY. Do not knock or shake fruit from the tree, but pick each specimen by hand. Products should be exhibited as nearly as possible in their natural state, and no preference will be given for highly polished fruits or vegetables.

Entries of "Commercial" containers of apples and sweet potatoes should be graded to uniform marketable size, high color, smoothness, trueness to type, freedom from cuts and bruises, and free from insect and fungus blemishes. They should be properly packed and placed in containers provided by the N.C. State Fair.

Entries of "Collections" and under "Any Other Variety" must be correctly named on the entry tag by the exhibitor. In the nomenclature of fruits, the names adopted by the American Pomological Society shall rule, and no variety will be accepted that has not been admitted to their catalog, except in the case of seedlings never before exhibited.

**Grower's name may not be displayed on exhibit until after the judging.**

## AWARDS AND JUDGING

No award will be made for unworthy specimens, where quality is lacking, or where any of the Rules and Regulations governing these exhibits are disregarded.

No article entered for competition in any class will be permitted to compete for a premium in any other class. AN EXHIBITOR CANNOT COMPETE FOR MORE THAN ONE PRIZE IN ANY CLASS.

No exhibitor will be allowed to discuss exhibits with the judges, or to interfere in any way while the judges are at work.



**ELIGIBILITY:** Open to all residents of North Carolina. Original works of art in specified media executed within the past two years and not previously exhibited at the North Carolina State Fair. There will be three separate categories and exhibitions for PROFESSIONAL, AMATEUR, and STUDENT artists.

**PROFESSIONAL\*\*** \$10.00 *entry fee in Professional Fine Arts.* Entry fees are non-refundable. Checks are to be made out to the North Carolina State Fair and should be *attached to the entry form.* All Fine Arts entries will be *juried by competent out-of-state judges.* Only the judges' choices will be hung. Cash prizes and ribbons

will be given in professional fine arts categories.

**AMATEUR\*\***                    *\$5.00 entry fee in Amateur Fine Arts.* All amateur art works will be exhibited AS SPACE ALLOWS. Cash prize and ribbons will be awarded for work selected from the exhibition.\*\*The entrant must decide which category either PROFESSIONAL, a person earning even a part-time income from the sale of the artist's fine art, or AMATEUR, a person who is just beginning an art career or does a very limited amount of fine art and has earned no substantial monetary remuneration for its creation.

**STUDENT:**                    No entry fee. One entry only. This category is for students elementary through high school age (in public, private, or home schools) who wish to enter one piece in the show on an individual basis. Thursday, October 11, at 4:00 p.m. for all Honey Competition entries (I-1 to I-36)

**RELEASE OF EXHIBITS: Sunday, October 21 after 10:00 p.m. POSITIVELY NOT BEFORE THAT DATE AND TIME.**

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Except in cases of conflict, in which event the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. **BE SURE TO READ THESE IN THE FRONT OF THIS BOOK BEFORE ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT.** Some - but not all - are repeated herewith for emphasis, and others of the following Rules and Regulations apply only to this department.

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!** The right is reserved to reject entries received after all available space is taken. Display Booths must be reserved on or before July 1. Booths not requested by this date will be assigned by invitation. Booth space will be allocated on basis of show record of applicant if there are more applicants than available space. Booth space assignments will be made before 4:00 p.m., Wednesday, October 10, 2001. Exhibitors may begin setting up displays at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, October 10 and must be in place for judging by 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 11, 2001. There will be no peddling, hawking, or selling of any kind in or around booths that is not in keeping with Fair policy.

Booths must be kept clean and neat. All items not on exhibit must be removed from exhibit area or stored in storage space under the booth. No boxes or other material shall be left on the floor behind the booths.

Official printed forms must be used in making applications for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use separate forms for entries in other departments. Be sure to fill in the application form *completely, accurately and legibly*. Give your rural route number, post office box number, or city street address and zip code, phone number and social security number.

Any name or reference to the exhibitor (other than entry number) on any entry including the display booth must be covered prior to judging.

All honey entries are limited to honey made in North Carolina during the current season. Preference in judging will be given to those beeswax entries which were made during the current season. All honey and beeswax entered by an exhibitor must have been produced by the exhibitor. All types of honey displayed must be protected from honeybees and other insects. Cellophane, glass, or transparent material of some other suitable type is recommended for this purpose.

Live bees and queens must be displayed in escape-proof observation hives or queen cages.

Observation hives must be cared for during the week. Dead bees must be removed at intervals. Bees must be given cleansing flights or exchanged for fresh bees. Due to space limitations, observation hives may not exceed a size equivalent to three standard frames.

All exhibits must be of required color, quality, and condition in order to receive premiums and prizes. No premium will be given to any one entry through lack of competition if the entry is of inferior quality.

There is a limit of one entry per person for each listed category.

Exhibitors are urged to personally deliver their exhibits at the Fair, but if this is not possible PRE-PAID shipments of non-perishable entries will be accepted if addressed to DIRECTOR, BEES AND HONEY DEPARTMENT, N.C. STATE FAIR, 1025 BLUE RIDGE BLVD., RALEIGH, N.C. 27607. Shipments should be carefully labeled and should indicate on the outside and inside of the package the Premium Number under which entered, a description of the contents of the package, and the exhibitor's name and address. Instruction for return or disposal of shipments at the end of the Fair must accompany each shipment. All entries must be delivered by 5:00 p.m., Wednesday, October 10. Foods cooked with honey must be in place for judging by 3:00 p.m., Thursday, October 11. Display booths must be set up on Thursday prior to judging time. Return shipments will be made via express with transportation charges collect unless otherwise provided for. Entries in Department I may be claimed between the hours of 10 a.m. and 12 noon, Monday, October 22. Baked and other perishable entries must be personally delivered to the Fair and will become property of the Fair and discarded if not claimed by 12:00 noon, Monday, October 22, 2001.

Comb honey and all other exhibits should be packed with care, according to parcel post or express regulations, so as to arrive in good, clean condition.

### FOODS COOKED WITH HONEY

All entries in this class must contain honey as one of the principal sweetening ingredients.

Entries must be prepared from ingredients compatible with commonly accepted recipes for the class in which they are entered. The purpose of this competition is to demonstrate skill in the use of honey in cooking. There are no other ingredient restrictions, and commercial mixes may be used.

Factors such as whether the entry is representative of the entered class and freshness of the product will be considered in the judging. It will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to see that entries are correctly classified and tagged. The score cards used in Department "W" (Culinary) Class 2 will be used as guides in judging foods cooked with honey.

All entries in these classes shall be on cardboard or paper plate and enclosed in a clear plastic bag tied with a twistem. No entries on glass or china will be accepted for display.

The entry tag must be securely attached to the plate. Each entry must be accompanied by a recipe on a 3x5 or suitable card using only one side of the card.

Exhibitors are required to enter at least 1/3 of a cake and bread for judging. Junior and Senior entries cannot be from the same cake. Commercial mixes are acceptable but not ranked as highly as items made from scratch. All entries will be discarded at the end of the Fair unless other arrangements have been made with the superintendent. Assistance may be provided to Junior participants but the entry must be primarily the effort of the entrant.

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Except in cases of conflict, in which event the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this division. **BE SURE TO READ THESE IN THE FRONT OF THIS BOOK BEFORE ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT.** Some - but not all - are repeated herewith for emphasis, and others of the following Rules and Regulations apply only to this Division.

## **ENTRIES**

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!!** The right is reserved and will be used to reject entries received after all available space is taken, even though this occurs before specified time for closing entries.

Official printed forms must be used in making application for entry. One will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use a separate form for making entries in each department. *Be sure to fill in the application form completely, accurately, and legibly.* Give your rural route number, post office number, or city street address, zip code, Social Security Number or Federal ID Number, and telephone number, including area code.

Indicate on the form the total number of animals you will exhibit and the total number of stall spaces or pens you will require, including those to be used for tack, feed and bedding.

List the class number, as indicated in the premium list, for which each entry is made. *Use a separate line for each animal.* Do not make entries in the Championship classes. Indicate if you plan to make entries in the group and/or herd classes. But it is not necessary to name the animals which will make up your group or herd until after judging of the individual classes. Entries in the group and herd classes must have previously been exhibited in the individual classes.

List, also, on the application form the name (or ear tag number) and registry number of its sire and dam, and the name of the breeder. Bring your registration certificates to the Fair; they must be shown if requested by the superintendent. All beef cattle and swine over six months of age and all sheep over three months of age must be registered with their respective breed associations in the name of the bonafide owner, who must show official evidence of ownership of animal at least 30 days prior to showing. (See exceptions to this rule for group classes only in some departments.)

Each breed of livestock must be exhibited by more than one farm if the breed is to be considered for continuance in the 2002 N.C. State Fair Premium List.

### FEES

Entry fees are required for all entries in the senior and open classes of the Livestock Division. *Entries exclusively in the junior livestock shows are not subject to fees.*

All applicants for entries must be noted on the entry form, AND REMITTANCES FOR SAME MUST ACCOMPANY THE ENTRY APPLICATION FORM. Reservations will not be made unless accompanied by the required fee and REMEMBER: THE RIGHT IS RESERVED TO REJECT ENTRIES AFTER ALL AVAILABLE SPACE IS TAKEN. ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED IN THE ORDER RECEIVED.

Be sure to indicate on the form the total number of animals you will be bringing and pay for up to two (2) additional spaces for tack and feed. Include remittances for these extra stall spaces or pens you will require, as well as for those actually required for the animals you will exhibit in the competitive classes.

**Animals duly entered in the show which will be exhibited competitively in the show ring will have priority on stall and pen space; thereafter, should additional space be available, display animals will be assigned stall or pen space.**

### HEALTH REGULATIONS

All health regulations will be strictly enforced, and decisions of the regulatory veterinarian concerning animal health status are final. No animals may be unloaded on the fairgrounds before being checked and approved by the regulatory veterinarian in charge. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS MUST HAVE HEALTH CERTIFICATES, EXCEPT CATTLE CONSIGNED TO THE MARKET STEER SHOW, AND THE REQUIRED TESTS. SEE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH SPECIES. A copy of the health certificate should be mailed to the State Veterinarian in North Carolina, Box 26062, Raleigh, NC 27611 at least three weeks prior to State Fair opening date. All species must follow specific entry requirements listed under each class rules and regulations. All entries shall be inspected prior to unloading between the hours of 7:00 am and 10:00 pm. Any and all animals not meeting the entry requirements and/or exhibiting any signs of disease or illness, may be refused entry, required to be isolated and/or required to be returned to the farm of origin. Any and all animals exhibiting any signs of disease or illness or found not to have met entry requirements after entry may, likewise, be required to be isolated and/or returned to the farm of origin.

#### Cattle - Dairy and Beef

All cattle except those consigned to the market steer show must be accompanied by an official health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian or an NCDA&CS or USDA veterinarian within 60 days of entry. The health certificate should contain the following:

1. Name and address of exhibitor.
2. Description of each animal including breed, age, sex, and registration, tattoo, or ear tag numbers.

3. A statement by the veterinarian signing the health certificate that the cattle listed are not infected with, nor have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his/her knowledge.
4. Information relating to brucellosis.
  - A. Those cattle which are native to North Carolina need not be tested. (Native meaning those cattle which were born in North Carolina or which have met North Carolina import requirements.)
  - B. Cattle originating from any certified brucellosis free herd, regardless of the state of origin, may enter North Carolina, provided that the following information is recorded on the official certificate.
    - (1) the individual identification of each animal;
    - (2) the herd certification number;
    - (3) the date of the last herd test; and
    - (4) a permit when otherwise required in the rule.
  - C. Cattle imported from a Class Free State shall originate from a herd not under quarantine and need not be tested.
  - D. Cattle imported from a Class A State shall originate from a herd not under quarantine and pass a negative official blood test within 60 days of entry into North Carolina.
  - E. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Rule, a brucellosis test is not required for steers or spayed females and no test prior to entry into the state is required of:
    - (1) Cattle under eight months of age;
    - (2) Dairy heifers under 20 months of age officially vaccinated against brucellosis; and
    - (3) Heifers of the beef breed less than 24 months of age and officially vaccinated against brucellosis.
5. Information relating to tuberculosis (cattle)

Any cattle over 6 months of age not originating from a Tuberculosis Free state shall be required to have an official tuberculosis test within 60 days of entry, unless from an accredited herd.

## Swine

An official health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian or an NCDA&CS or USDA veterinarian issued within 30 days of entry must accompany all swine (including market hogs). The health certificate must contain the following:

1. Name and address of exhibitor.
2. Description of the swine including age, sex, breed, and registration, ear tag or ear notch numbers.
3. Statement by the veterinarian attesting that the swine listed are not infected with nor have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his/her knowledge.
4. Statement by the veterinarian that all breeding swine in the consignment originate from a Validated Brucellosis-Free and Qualified Pseudorabies-Free Herd. The herd validation qualification numbers must be listed. This requirement does not apply to market hogs.
5. A statement by the veterinarian that all swine in the consignment have originated in a PRV monitored herd and passed a negative official test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the date of entry to the fair or originated from a pseudorabies qualified herd and did not originate on a premise located within one mile of a known pseudorabies infected herd. Qualified pseudorabies-free herd status will be accepted in lieu of the negative 30-day test if qualified herd number is recorded on health certificate.

## Goats

An official health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian or an NCDA&CS or USDA veterinarian issued within 60 days of entry must accompany all goats. Dairy goats must meet the requirements listed under class rules and regulations in addition to the requirements listed below:

1. Name and address of exhibitor.
2. Description of each animal including breed, age, sex, and any registration, tattoo or ear tag numbers.
3. A statement by the veterinarian signing the health certificate that the goats listed are not infected with, or have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his/her knowledge.
4. All goats over 6 months, except those consigned to the market show, imported from out-of-state must have a brucellosis and tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entry, unless originating from an accredited, certified herd.

## Sheep

An official health certificate issued within 60 days of entry by an accredited veterinarian or an NCDA&CS or USDA veterinarian must accompany all sheep entering the fairgrounds. The health certificate must contain the following:

1. Name and address of exhibitor.
2. Description of the sheep including age, sex, breed, or cross and registration numbers.
3. A statement by the veterinarian signing the health certificate that the animals listed are not infected with, or have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his/her knowledge. *Any animal showing evidence of suspicious fugal lesions must have a signed veterinarian's statement on the health certificate with the date and type of treatment.*
4. If the sheep originate from a scabies eradication area, a statement from the veterinarian to the effect that the flock of origin is scabies-free, and the animals listed on the health certificate have been dipped under State or Federal Supervision within 10 days prior to entry to the Fair.
5. All sheep over 6 months, except those consigned to the market show, being imported from out of state must have a brucellosis and tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entry, unless originating from an accredited, certified herd.

### OTHER ANIMALS ENTERING THE FAIRGROUNDS

Any animal of the above species entering the fairgrounds *regardless of their purpose of entry* must meet the requirements that are listed above for that species. All equidae, six months old and older, must be accompanied by an official negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia within 12 months of entering the fairgrounds. This includes equidae in pony rides, exhibits, petting zoos, and competition events.

Animals categorized as exotic in North Carolina include bison, buffalo and all other bovidae (other than domestic cattle), camelids (llama, alpaca, camel), must be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 60 days by an accredited veterinarian or an NCDA&CS or USDA veterinarian. The certificate must show individual identification. Animals from out-of-state must have negative test results for brucellosis within 30 days and tuberculosis within 60 days for all animals six months old and older. (Camelids are to be tested for tuberculosis at the axillary space). The certification statement ***"The herd of origin has had no brucellosis or tuberculosis diagnosed within the past 12 months"***, must be included on the certificate. Cervidae (any member of the deer family) must meet the import requirements for North Carolina. Contact the State Veterinarian's office for details.

## EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS

Only vehicles operated by the Fair management will be allowed in the barn area.

The Fair management will use diligence to ensure the safety of livestock entered for exhibition or display, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury, theft or damage by fire, lightning, wind, or any other agency, to such livestock on exhibition or display.

All livestock on exhibition must be cared for by the exhibitor (except entries in Special Junior Dairy Cattle Exhibits). All stalls and pens (except entries in Special Exhibits) will be well bedded one time by the Fair, free of charge. Thereafter, exhibitors will be required to furnish their own bedding.

The Fair reserves the right to discriminate against both excessive obesity, which cannot be a profitable condition for breeding animals and excessive leanness, in which conditions are unfit for exhibition.

No barren animals will be eligible in breeding classes. An affidavit that an animal is a breeder must be furnished on request.

All cattle must be halter-broken. Boars over one year of age must have their tusks removed.

A great educational feature of the Fair is the exhibitions and parades of approved livestock by breeds and ages. Exhibitors refusing for any cause not meeting with the approval of the management to lead out animals for parade will not only forfeit all premiums won, but will be barred from further participation in the Fair, and will be required to remove their stock from the Fairground within six hours after such refusal, and will forfeit any fees paid.

Misrepresentation as to breeding and irregularity in showing will be exposed and any premium won by such exhibitor will be withheld. Certificates of registration must be shown on demand of the Livestock Superintendent.

Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation in exhibition animals, including the use of steroids and other drugs, as well as lifting, dyeing or filling under the skin, will be considered fraud and deception. The North Carolina State Fair Management reserves the right to test the grand and reserve champion barrow, steer, and wether, and to conduct other random testing as deemed appropriate. The grand and reserve champions may be sampled at the fair. Exhibitors involved in any such treatment will be barred from exhibition at this Fair, and all Fairs holding membership in the International Association of Fairs and Exposition will be notified.

Exhibitors must keep the space in the rear of their stalls or pens, and the alleyways in the exhibition halls, clear and clean. All litter must be deposited where directed by the Superintendent of Directors.

Animals must be transported to and from the Fairgrounds at the expense of the exhibitor, except for some Junior Exhibitors. The Fair management will not pay any charges for express, freight, or drayage.

Exhibitors are responsible for ascertaining when their stock will be judged. Animals must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Exhibitors failing to comply with this rule may have their animals excluded from competition.

Exhibitors are not allowed to make substitutions between breeds. One substitution may be made within the breed.

## JUDGES AND AWARDS

NO EXHIBITOR MAY RECEIVE MORE THAN TWO PREMIUM MONIES IN ANY ONE CLASS. However, ribbons will be awarded exactly as the animals are placed by the judge. EXAMPLE: An exhibitor makes three entries in a class, and his animals place "First", "Second" and "Third". He would receive only the first and second premium monies, but all three ribbons. Then, the owner of the animal placing "Fourth" would receive the third-place premium money and the fourth-place ribbon; and so on down the line.

The decision of the judges will be final, and no appeal will be considered except in the case of protest. The rules of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions govern appeals at the North Carolina State Fair. Protests must be in writing and filed with the General Livestock Director by noon of the day following the award, accompanied by a protest fee of \$5.00 which will be retained by the fair if the protest is not sustained by an impartial protest committee appointed by the General Livestock Director. No unworthy animal will be awarded a premium. Where there are fewer animals shown in the class than the number of premiums offered, the judge may, at his/her discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animal or animals deserve.

Where there is only one entry in a class, second premium will be awarded unless in the opinion of the judge the animal is sufficiently meritorious as to justify the full award as provided for.

### HERDSMEN'S CONTESTS

Special prizes will be awarded in contests for herdsman, shepherd and caretakers of animals in all livestock departments. All herdsman will automatically be considered entrants and no special entry is required. Judges will be assigned by the Livestock Director. The contests will start at a time designated by each Department.

The following score card will serve as the basis for the judges in the Herdsmen's contest making their decisions.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Except in cases of conflict, in which event the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Livestock Division and the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. **BE SURE TO READ BOTH BEFORE**

ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT. Some - but not all - are repeated herewith for emphasis, and others of the following Rules and Regulations apply only to this Department.

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!!** The right is reserved to reject entries received after all available space is taken and after the closing date.

Official printed forms must be used in making application for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use separate forms for making entries in other departments and separate forms for the Junior and Senior Shows. *Be sure to fill in the application form completely, accurately, and legibly.* Give your rural route number, post office box number, or city street address, zip code, social security or federal ID number. Entries in Open Show must be made in the name of the owner as recorded on registration certificate.

Exhibitors are not allowed to make substitutions between breeds. Two substitutions per exhibitor may be made within a breed.

Indicate on the form the total number of animals you will exhibit, and the total number of stall spaces you will require, *including those to be used for gear, feed and bedding.* No fee is required for entries exclusively in the Junior Show. Junior entries wishing to show in the open show will be required to pay stall fee in accordance with open show registration. Entries in the group and herd classes must have previously been exhibited in the individual classes.

List the class number, as indicated in the premium list, for which each entry is made. *Use a separate line for each animal.*

List, also, on the application form the name and registry number of each animal entered, its date of birth, and its sex. Bring your registration certificates to the Fair; they must be shown at any time if requested by the Superintendent. Registration papers will be required at the time of show of all group classes.

All animals over six months of age must be registered with their respective breed associations in the name of the bona fide owner.

In breeding classes, to be eligible to show, all cows 36 month of age or older must have produced a calf carried to maturity within the last 12 months prior to the opening date of the Fair. In case the exhibitor, upon demand of the superintendent, cannot verify by affidavit or registration certificate the facts of the above requirements, the animal will be excluded from competition.

In making awards in the breeding classes, the judge will lay much stress on the evidence of superior breeding qualities. When animals show evidence of being "overdone" (overloaded with flesh) they will be discriminated against accordingly.

## FEES

Entry fees are required for all entries in the senior and open classes of the livestock Division. *Entries exclusively in the junior livestock shows are not subject to fees.*

All applicants for entries must be noted on the entry form, **AND REMITTANCES FOR SAME MUST ACCOMPANY THE ENTRY APPLICATION FORM.** Reservations will not be made unless accompanied by the required fee and **REMEMBER: THE RIGHT IS RESERVED TO REJECT ENTRIES AFTER ALL AVAILABLE SPACE IS TAKEN. ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED IN THE ORDER RECEIVED.**

Be sure to indicate on the form the total number of animals you will be bringing and pay for additional spaces for tack and feed. Include remittances for these extra stall spaces you will require, as well as for those actually required for the animals you will exhibit in the competitive classes.

**Animals duly entered in the show which will be exhibited competitively in the show ring will have priority on stall space; thereafter, should additional space be available, display animals will be assigned stall space.**

## THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION

### *Show Ring Code of Ethics*

The showing of registered dairy cattle is an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. Additionally, it is an important part of the program of the various dairy breed associations to stimulate and sustain interest in breeding registered dairy cattle. This relates to both spectators and exhibitors. In this connection, The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association believes that it is in the best interest of the breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image of their cattle in the show ring. It recognizes that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle which are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy condition so that they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal appearance and condition. Conversely, it recognizes certain practices in the cataloging, handling and presentation of cattle in the show ring which are unacceptable.

The following practices or procedures are considered unacceptable and defined as being fraudulent and/or unethical in the showing of registered dairy cattle.

- (1) Misrepresenting the age and/or milk status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
- (2) Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally, with an irritant or counterirritant, or other substance to artificially improve the conformation.
- (3) Surgery or insertion of foreign material under the skin, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
- (4) Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring, or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
- (5) Setting teats or manipulating a teat to alter its normal position such as to unnaturally hold its plumb or to alter its length.

The following practices and procedures are considered to detract from the image of the show ring when carried to excess and will be given slight to serious discrimination in placing animals within class.

- (1) Excessive manipulation of hair.
- (2) Use of artificial hair except for false switches.
- (3) Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of showmen.
- (4) Improper fitting practices such as over filling and over bagging.

Practices which should be encouraged to enhance the image of the show:

- (1) Establish uniform dress code for exhibitors in the show ring.
- (2) Recognize good herdsmanhip and exhibits in the barn in keeping with the basic philosophy of the PDCA, ethics are an individual responsibility of the owner of each animal shown.

**Violations of these policies are subject to the disciplinary provisions of the appropriate dairy breed association and/or show management.**

### HERDSMEN'S CONTEST

All herdsmen in charge of dairy animals entered in the Senior "Open" Show will automatically be considered entrants in this contest, designed to promote neatness, courtesy, attention to show requirements, and all around efficiency on the part of personnel in charge of animals on exhibit. The contest will start Thursday, October 18

at noon and will continue until noon Sunday, October 21 at which time the winners will be announced. The score card which will serve as the basis for the judges making their decision will be found under the General Rules and Regulations of the Livestock Division.

### HEALTH REGULATIONS

Health regulations of the Veterinary Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. **BE SURE TO READ THESE UNDER "RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION"** before entering or competing in this department.

Every precaution should be taken on the part of the exhibitors to use individual utensils in feeding and watering cattle. Common water troughs are forbidden. All trucks used for transportation of cattle to the Fair should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before use. Vehicles regularly used for the transportation of animals are considered "exposed" premises under the health regulations of the Veterinary Division.

### MILKING FACILITIES

Facilities for milking will be available for exhibitors with lactating cows. Exhibitors are encouraged to use these facilities and avoid milking cattle in open pails in the barn. **Anyone caught adding milk containing antibiotics to the bulk tank will have premiums withheld.** The facility will open Wednesday, October 17, at 6:00 p.m. and will close Monday, October 22, at 8:00 a.m.

### FEEDING AND BEDDING

Bedding will be available on the grounds. Exhibitors will need to bring feed and bedding with them or arrange purchase of same off the grounds.

### SHOW HARNESS

All exhibitors will be required to wear show harnesses while exhibiting their animals.

JUNIOR BEST THREE FEMALES - Coming from classes eligible for Junior Champion. All bred and owned by exhibitor. Each exhibitor limited to one entry.

BEST UDDER - The judges will select a first and second place animal based on udder alone from each of the six milking classes. **The premium will be increased by 100% for the first place and 50% for the second place.** The animals will be recognized and appropriate ribbons presented. All cows in the class will be considered and no entry is needed. If, in the opinion of the judge, the quality of the udders being considered are not worthy of the awards, then no award will be made.

1. Except as noted, all of the rules and regulations of the Dairy Department, the Livestock Division, and the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair, will prevail in this show.
2. Open to exhibitors 6 years of age and under 19 years of age as of January 1, 2001 and residents of North Carolina.
3. No exhibitor in the Junior Dairy Show may show more than three animals.
4. Exhibitors must have personally fitted and cared for the animals 60 or more days prior to the show.
5. All animals must be shown without assistance. Adults, other than the officials, will not be allowed in the ring during the show unless requested by a show official. (Exception: Junior County Herd.)
6. **Registration papers or DHIA calf pages must be presented to the Junior Show superintendent. All Junior Show animals shown in the Open Shows will be checked in between 8:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., Thursday, October 18 at the Livestock Hall of Fame room. Junior Show animals that are only shown in the Junior Show must be checked in by 5:00 p.m. Friday, October 19.**
7. Grade animals must have a DHIA calf page in order to be shown. These animals must have some type of identification that management can use to verify birth dates.
8. The Danish system of judging will be used; however, the first three animals in each class will be judged.
9. No entry or stall fee will be charged for entries exclusively in the Junior Show.
10. Entries for Open and Junior Show must be on separate forms because different class numbers are used. Each youth should complete their own individual form.

Incorrect or incomplete forms will not be accepted and will be returned to the exhibitor. Additional copies may be made of the entry form. The following information will not be required of junior show entries: name of sire and name of dam. All other information is required.

11. Substitute entries will be allowed only when such substitution replaces an animal which dies, became sick, was injured or deleted by the Superintendent. Only one such qualified substitute will be allowed per exhibitor.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Except in cases of conflict, in which event the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Livestock Division and the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. **BE SURE TO READ BOTH BEFORE ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT.** Some - but not all - are repeated herewith for emphasis, and others of the following Rules and Regulations apply only to this Department.

MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!! THE RIGHT IS RESERVED AND WILL BE USED TO REJECT ENTRIES OR PART OF ENTRIES RECEIVED AFTER ALL AVAILABLE SPACE IS TAKEN.

Official printed forms must be used in making application for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. **Use separate forms for making entries in other departments.** *Be sure to fill in the application form completely, accurately, and legibly.* Give your rural route number, post office number, or city street address and zip code.

Indicate on the form the total number of animals you will exhibit, and the total number of stall spaces you will require, including those to be used for gear, feed and bedding (no more than 2 for tack). Payment of a fee of \$5.00 for each space requested must accompany your application.

ALL NURSE COWS HAVE BEEN RULED OUT and will not be allowed on the fairgrounds.

List the class number, as indicated in the premium list, for which each entry is made. Do not make entries in the championship classes. *Use a separate line for each animal.* Indicate if you plan to make entries in the group classes, but it is not necessary to name the animals which will make up your group entries until after judging of the individual classes. Entries in the group classes must have previously been exhibited in the individual classes.

List, also, on the application form the name registry number of each animal entered, its date of birth, its sex, the names and registry numbers of its sire and dam, and the name of the breeder. Bring your registration certificates to the Fair; they must be shown if requested by the superintendent. No photo copies will be accepted.

All animals over six months of age must be registered with their respective breed association in the name of the bona fide owner, who must have owned the animal for at least 30 days prior to October 1, 2001. No Exhibitor may win more than two premium monies in any one class.

Failure to properly display exhibitor/entry number during show will constitute forfeiture of premiums.

Health regulations of the Veterinary Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. BE SURE TO READ THESE UNDER "RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION" before entering or competing in this department.

Every precaution should be taken on the part of exhibitors to use individual utensils in feeding and watering cattle. Common water troughs are forbidden. All cars and trucks used for transportation of animals are considered "exposed premises" under the health regulations of the Veterinarian Division.

First place winners in individual classes are eligible to compete for Championship awards. Other first place winners in individual classes, plus the second place winner in the individual class which produced the Champion, will be eligible to compete for Reserve Championship awards.

A breed must have more than 30 head shown in the individual classes to maintain a show.

If a breed drops below 30 head in the show, it will automatically be placed on a one-year probation. If the breed falls below 30 head two consecutive years, the show will be dropped.

For a breed to start a new show, the application must be made to the State Fair General Livestock Director along with assurance of at least 30 head by December 1 preceding the date of the proposed show. An official show classification from the breed registry must also accompany all requests.

All breeds desiring a live animal display will make the request in writing to the State Fair General Livestock Director by September 1. Regular breeding cattle tie spaces will be assigned by the beef superintendent not to exceed 10 tie spaces including tack. The display cattle will be subject to the same rules and regulations as the open show entries.

Official Breed representatives are encouraged to attend the show and check animals to be shown. However, they must complete their duties and inform the Livestock Office 20 hours prior to show time or not later than 4 p.m. the day preceding their respective show whichever is greater.

### PARTICIPATION STATEMENT

Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show.

Any animal not having legible tattoo is ineligible to compete and will be barred from showing.

**BLOOD TYPING FOR PARENTAGE VERIFICATION.** Under the Association Rules (Part 3, Section XI, Rule 2) each animal for which entry application (registration) is received, may be subjected to a blood type test to verify both ACCURACY OF PARENTAGE and TRADITIONAL ANGUS BLOOD TYPE. Staff of the American Angus Association must supervise the collection of blood samples. Animals are often sampled at shows, fairs, or events where the Association personnel participate.

The recorded sire and dam must qualify as parents of the sampled animal through blood chemistry. If recorded parent is excluded (as a parent) as a result of blood type, the owner may request, at his own expense, the Association to determine the actual parent. Failure to determine the sire and dam disqualifies the animal's eligibility in the Angus Herdbook, and the registration certificate becomes null and void. Any animal with a non-traditional blood type is ineligible for the Angus Herdbook.

All animals to be eligible for an Open Charolais Breeding Class must be purebred and registered with AICA. Only Bona Fide (original) certificates of registration will be accepted as evidence of registration and ownership; NO PHOTO COPIES.

An animal is eligible to enter or compete in an open Charolais breeding class if registered in country of origin outside the United States and is eligible for purebred registry in the AICA Herdbook.

All animals to be eligible may be approved by a sifting committee designated by the AICA. Stall space will not be provided for any Charolais cattle that have not been accepted by the sifting committee.

All animals are subject to a medical examination in order to determine age, and each animal will be present in the show ring in its natural conformation without alteration or modification. Use of artificial tailheads not permitted.

Any animal not having a legible tattoo or firebrand number is ineligible and will be barred from showing.

Bulls from classes KA218, KA219, KA220, KA221, KA222 must have a valid, satisfactory semen test certificate in possession. This certificate is valid for the entire show season.

All animals shown in individual classes must be weaned, with the exception of the Cow/Calf Class and calves at the side of females calved after Sept. 1, 1999. Calves must be prebred and registered with AICA. In the Cow/Calf Class, the calf must have the opportunity to nurse. The judge may make his final placing decision based on this criteria. Females calved after Sept. 1, 1999, must show in individual female classes appropriate to age. Nurse cows are not permitted.

All females 20 months and older exhibited at AICA-sanctioned shows must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy from a licensed veterinarian or have produced fertile eggs as certified in a written statement by a licensed veterinarian or embryologist or have a calf at side.

AICA requires that all animals be shown with a halter and suggests that all bulls be shown with a nose lead.

ALL EXHIBITS OF CHAROLAIS BREEDING CATTLE SHALL BE GOVERNED BY THE AICA BY-LAWS, ARTICLE XVIII, TITLED EXHIBITION OF ANIMALS. THE INSPECTION OF EXHIBIT CATTLE IS SPECIFIED IN ARTICLE XVIII, PARAGRAPH C, OF THE ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS AND NON-COMPLIANCE OF EXHIBIT INSPECTION IS SPECIFIED IN PARAGRAPH D OF THE SAME ARTICLE XVIII.

ARTICLE XVIII, PARAGRAPH C, POINT 2, "Each animal will be presented in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical or other change for cosmetic purpose, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method per os (by esophagus) is prohibited. Silicone injection or other injection for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited. Anabolic steroid use shall likewise be prohibited and any animal testing positive for anabolic steroid or diuretic use shall be presumed to be altered and modified."



### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

1. All animals must be registered with the North American Limousin Foundation.
2. All animals must be 75% (3/4) Limousin, or greater, as indicated by registration certificate. Percentage and purebred Limousin cattle shall compete in the same classes and championships.
3. All animals must be properly tattooed and will be inspected at the show. Tattoos must be legible and must properly match the registration certificate.
4. To maintain a high degree of confidence in Limousin shows, the North American Limousin Foundation reserves the right to disqualify any animal that has been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting shall include the following:
  - a) any altering of the natural color of the animal by use of paints, hair coloring conditioners, colored show foam, graphite, colored powders, or any other substances; all animals subject to white towel test (Amended 8/98)
  - b) the North American Limousin Foundation reserves the right to collect hair samples from any animal, at any show
  - c) the addition of any hair or hair like substances, including false tailheads and false polls (false tail switches are allowed)
  - d) the cutting, tearing or gluing of the hide or underneath the hid or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal
  - e) the injection of any gas, solid or liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation
  - f) any attempts to disrupt or change the normal dental development of the animal
  - g) any products/solutions/liquids administered internally or externally to alter the conformation of the animal is prohibited. This includes the use of steroids, growth promotants, and the act of artifically filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method per os (by esophagus).

EXCEPTIONS: In the case of severely sick or severely dehydrated animals, the exhibitor may have fluids or electrolytes administered by the licensed official show veterinarian with the approval of the show superintendent and/or North American Limousin Foundation representative. This exception is not applicable on show day or weigh-in/check-in day.

5. All bulls over one year of age must show with a nose-lead. The right to disqualify from the show any animal deemed unmanageable is reserved by the Limousin show superintendent and the show management.
6. All protests against exhibitors or individual animals dealing with the age or genetic background of show cattle must be submitted in writing and signed by five (5) lifetime members of the North American Limousin Foundation and presented to the show superintendent within 12 hours after the completion of the show.
7. The North American Limousin Foundation reserves the right to mouth animals for dental development at any show sponsored by the Foundation.
8. All animals shown must be solid red or black above the flanks beginning in the 1999-2000 show season (Amended 8/98).
9. It is recommended that if 10 or more head are entered and checked-in in any single class, the class shall be split into two equal classes as determined by age.
10. Calves exhibited alongside dams in the cow/calf class are ineligible to show as individuals. In addition, all calves exhibited alongside dams must be registered. (January 2000 amendment).
11. In shows occurring after January 1, 2001, calves born through June 30, 2000 are eligible to show.

### SECTION X

#### Rule I. GENERAL REGULATIONS

- A. Registered Red Angus Cattle, including Category I-A (100%) and Category I-B (87% through 99%) will be eligible to show. The decision to show Category I-A and Category I-B together in the classes shall be left to the individual states, with respect to state fairs, and such shows that come under state supervision. All show under Red Angus Association sponsorship will be conducted under a joint show provision wherein Category I-A and Category I-B show together in the same classes. It is mandatory that the category and blood percentage be printed as the certificate states on all stall cards show programs and sale catalogues at the National and Regional Shows.
- B. All animals entered must conform to all show and Association eligibility and requirements.
- C. Cattle entered in any Red Angus show must be officially registered in the appropriate Red Angus Association Herdbook. Exhibitors are subject to all rules, regulations and policies of the Red Angus Association of America.
- D. Entries in classes at any Red Angus show are accepted with the understanding that each exhibitor agrees to conform to the rules and regulations of the Red Angus Association with the reference to inspection of entries, such as blood typing, mouthing and such other inspections prescribed by the Red Angus Association of America.

- E. Any animal entered in a Red Angus show found to have an illegible tattoo, improper or incorrect tattoo or no tattoo, or dental development in excess of allowable limits, will be disqualified for that and subsequent Red Angus shows. Reinstatement of animals thus disqualified can be authorized only by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the Red Angus Association of America.
- F. Each exhibitor and /or owner of Red Angus cattle entered in any Red Angus show or exhibition is required to insure that each animal will be exhibited in its natural conformation and structure and without any alterations or modifications, with the exception of acceptable fitting, grooming, fitting or treatment of hooves.
- G. Unacceptable modification, alteration, grooming, fitting or treatment of hooves will subject the individual animal to disqualification in the show.
- H. The use of "false tailheads" is considered an unethical fitting practice. Any animal found to have a "false tailhead" will be immediately disqualified. The exhibitor responsible for use of the "false tailhead" will be subject to disciplinary action by the Board of Directors of the Red Angus Association.

Rule II: OWNERSHIP

- A. Each entry in a Red Angus show must be made in the name of the owner of record, or a member of the immediate family of the owner of record, appearing on the Registration Certificate.
- B. Partnership animals must be so registered and entered under the partnership designation.
- C. Exhibitors must have official Registration Certificates on all entries available for inspection by show and/or Association officials. This may include officially produced copies of original Registration Certificates obtainable at no charge from the Red Angus Association National Office.
- D. Animals entered in any Red Angus show must have been registered in the name of the person entering said animal(s) not less than thirty (30) days prior the date of judging.
- E. Substitutions for animals already entered in a Red Angus show will be permitted up to and including seven (7) days previous to the announced date of judging, providing such substitution(s) is/are permitted by the show management.

This show will be governed by the Rules and Regulations Breeders Guide, August 1988, published by the RAAA. Section X.

 GRAND CHAMPION BULL (Calf, Intermediate, Junior & Senior Champions) ..... Banner  
 RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION BULL (Remaining age Champions and Reserve Age Champion to the Grand Champion) ..... Banner
- KA531 - Senior Get-of-Sire - Four animals by the same sire, both sexes represented, need not be owned by the exhibitor. All animals must have been shown in their respective classes.
- KA532 - Junior Get-of-Sire - Three animals by the same sire, both sexes represented, need not be owned by the exhibitor. Entries must have been calved on or after September 1, 2000. All animals must have been shown in their respective classes.
- KA533 - Produce-of-Dam - Two animals, either or both sexes, both shown in their respective classes. Animals shown in this class need not be owned by the exhibitor.
- KA534 - Premier Breeders Class - Four animals, bred and owned by the exhibitor or member of immediate family, either or both sexes represented. Each animal must have been shown in their respective classes.
- KA535 - Premier Exhibitor Class - Will be computed from exhibitor's placement in individual classes only as follows: 3 points for each First; 2 points for each Second; 1 point for each Third. Maximum number of placements used to determine winner shall be limited to 5. (In case of tie, group class placements will be used to determine the winner).

### **GROUND RULE**

In our Standard Show Classification only the Premier Breeders Class specifies "owned by the exhibitor." The other group classes need not be owned by exhibitor, therefore cannot be used to break ties.

To correct the possibility of a tie for Premier Exhibitor Class, where a tie exists through 5 placements, and neither exhibitor has an entry in the Premier Breeder Class, additional placements (beyond the stated 5 limitation) in the individual classes will be used, but only to the point where the tie is broken.



# SANTA GERTRUDIS SHOW

## Approved Santa Gertrudis Open and Junior Shows

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Heifers 24 months of age or older to be eligible must have produced a calf or be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian. If animal is open due to being in an embryo transfer program this fact must be verified by a written statement signed by a licensed embryo technician.
2. A cow shown with calf at side: Calf must be her natural calf meeting the standard of excellence.
3. All senior bull classes (late junior yearling bull and over) must have either a nose ring or a nose clip for show purposes.
4. All animals must be individually identified by tattoo, numerical firebrand, or freeze brand.
5. To be eligible to compete in SGBI approved junior shows, animal(s) must be recorded in the name of the junior member. This recorded junior must feed, fit, care for, and show the animal entered.
6. All animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on the entire body, legs, and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or change its appearance. **\*Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points won by same exhibitors.**
7. Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age.
8. Entries in each class will be placed 1,2,3, etc. Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
9. Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show. Animals will be lined up according to age for the judge.
10. To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals to be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue. Animals will be inspected by Field Service Representative (if present) assisted by one member of Shows and Exhibits Committee or Breed Standards Committee if needed to settle disputes. If no Field Service Representative is present, it will be done by committee members not involved in that class.
11. SGBI reserves the right to tooth animals without prior notice to the breeders in order to verify age of cattle.
12. There must be at least five (5) exhibitors and twenty-five (25) head of cattle, or a minimum of fifty (50) head of cattle to constitute a recognized Santa Gertrudis Show.
13. In all shows in which fifty (50) head or less entered, all early and late classes may be combined at the discretion of the show officials.
14. Classes with over thirty (30) entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
15. The judge **must** be an SGBI approved judge.
16. Each exhibitor must be a member in good standings with SGBI.
17. Dress for showing in an approved SGBI show shall be of clean and neat clothing. Hats or bareheaded with no caps. This is for both Open and Junior shows. **No** tennis shoes.
18. Juniors showing in open shows are allowed and encouraged. Entry must be shown by the owner or immediate family member (sister, brother, mother, father,

- grandparents). No animal may be fitted or shown by any open exhibitor at any time during the junior's ownership period. An exception is transportation, feed and care, to a show may be allowed. Refer to junior ownership rules.
19. Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, or other appearance change for cosmetic purposes, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Silicon injection or other injections for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited.
  20. If entries are not properly fitted and good herdsmanship followed the owner may be asked to not display their cattle until adhering to the proper procedures as outlined in our herdsmanship paper.
  21. **ETHICS:** The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body. Animals showing signs of having been operated upon or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults in conformation or with intent to deceive relative to the animal's soundness, will be disqualified. Every exhibitor, in consideration of his entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the Shows and Exhibits Committee and agrees that the conclusions reached by the committee as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or overage, shall be final, without recourse against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Shows and Exhibits Committee according to the equities of the case.
  22. Any exhibitor whether it be the owner or custom fitter or anyone else who has the custody of the animal being shown in any SGBI approved show, who shows an animal which has had an anabolic steroid administration to it either by injection or diuretic or any other administration, shall be barred from showing in an SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. The animal shall be barred from ever showing in a SGBI approved show again.
  23. No pumping or filling of an animal with liquid, air or any other substance is allowed. Violations will result in disqualification and banning from all shows of that exhibitor and/or owner.
  24. Any exhibitor who knowingly shows an animal in a SGBI approved show who is in violation of the rule herein above set forth relating to showing an animal in its natural conformation and structure as defined herein above may be suspended by the Board of Directors for six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense.
  25. Any person who furnished the birthday of the animal to SGBI either on the IPRA or some other document (whereby that birthday information is transferred to the registration certificate) and that animal is exhibited in a SGBI approved show with an incorrect age and the age determined by the SGBI designated veterinarian exceeds the age listed on the registration certificate by more than 30 days, the person furnishing the birthday above and such person furnishing said information to SGBI for inclusion on the registration certificate shall be barred from showing in a SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. However the animal, if transferred to another owner, may be placed in the correct class and be shown again.
  26. At all National Open Shows and at any other show determined by the Executive Committee of the Board of Director of SGBI, all animals shall be weighed and their weights and weight per day of age made known to the judge and show officials. It shall be accomplished by the show officials and/or representatives of SGBI.

27. SGBI and its representative have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited animals. Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all shows rules as adopted by SGBI.
28. Each exhibitor shall submit his registered Santa Gertrudis cattle to such tests and examinations as may be requested and/or required by the SGBI, its authorized representatives, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair.
29. For an in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgement past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision there from.
30. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the association.
31. **APPEALS:** An appeal from the decision of the veterinarian or designated association representation designated by the SGBI under sections 1 and 4 of the Inspection of Exhibits may be made to the Executive Committee of SGBI if the following requirements are satisfied.
  1. the appeal is in writing and is signed by the appealing party; and
  2. the appealing party files the written appeal with SGBI Board of Directors or SGBI Representative or fair officials as soon as possible after the veterinarian's or designated association representatives' decision is rendered and in any event within six (6) hours of the time of the veterinarian's or designated association representatives' decision was made. If an appeal satisfying the foregoing requirements is filled with the SGBI Board of Directors, the Board of Directors shall hold a hearing at which the appealing party and the Veterinarian or designated association representatives whose decision is being appealed shall present statements and other evidence that is relevant to the matter, following which the Board of Directors shall render a decision which shall be final and conclusive.
32. **PROCEDURES TO FILE PROTEST:**
  1. File protest with show that infraction occurred. Follow their protest rules.
  2. File the same protest with the Shows and Exhibits Committee. Contact the chairman.
  3. Three exhibitors must sign the protest.
  4. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100.00, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Shows and Exhibits Committee within twenty-four hours after the occasion for such protests.
  5. Order of hearing a protest:
    - a. Chairman of Shows and Exhibits Committee
    - b. Action by Shows and Exhibits Committee
    - c. Final action by Board of Directors
    - d. Follow appeal procedure as outlined in Rules and Regulations
  6. All rules and regulations that have been properly protested to the shows and Exhibits Committee shall be subject to the following penalties:
    - a. Loss of Premium money
    - b. Loss of Awards
    - c. Suspension from showing that animal as deemed necessary. Penalty may be for one show, two or three or as long as deemed necessary for the offense.
    - d. Suspension of the exhibitor being the same as other SGBI Rules penalties.
33. Failure to adhere to each shows specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that

particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our point show system.

34. **DISQUALIFICATIONS:** An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that a judge over-looked an animal will be considered. If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, the existing show may excuse him/her from the ring and exclude them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be withheld. If an animal is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the animals placing below him may be moved up (at the option of the Shows and Exhibits Committee) to fill the vacated position.

1. Open to exhibitors that have not reached their 19th birthday as of October 15, 2001, all of whom must be residents of the State of North Carolina. Exhibitors are allowed to nominate four steers to the State Fair Office by May 15. Steers may be identified by tattoo, bled, urine sampled, or nose printed by representatives of the NCDA from May 15 to Oct. 22, 2001.
2. Steers must be in possession of exhibitor by May 15, 2001. Steers may be shown in county or district show within the State of North Carolina prior to being shown at the N.C. State Fair. Any exhibitor may exhibit out-of-state upon written approval by the superintendent and only when the steer is exhibited in the North Carolina resident's name. Otherwise, all steers must be fed in North Carolina from May 15, 2000 to October 12, 2001 by the exhibitor.
3. If a junior has more than one steer in a class, the other steer must be shown by a junior (must be a resident of North Carolina) approved by the show superintendent.
4. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries. Each entry must weigh 1000 pounds or greater and no reweighs will be allowed.
5. Each junior exhibitor **MUST** fill out his/her **OWN** entry form.
6. **ENTRY PROCESS.** Steers may be mouthed, and ear-tagged on Thursday, October 11, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the west side of the Graham Livestock Building. **CONFIRMATION LETTERS RECEIVED FROM THE STATE FAIR OFFICE CONFIRMING THE RECEIPT OF ENTRIES MUST BE PRESENTED BY EXHIBITORS AT CHECK-IN.** Steers can have two permanent teeth, all other-teeth must be baby teeth and in place. **Steers and bedding will not be allowed in the Graham Bldg. until 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, October 10, 2001.**
7. Classes will be broken by weight so that a relatively equal number of steers are in each class. Any steer not passing the proper tests will be disqualified.
8. Steers must be halter broken and dehorned. Unruly animals which may endanger the safety of exhibitors may be asked to leave the ring.
9. The closing date for entries shall be September 15, 2001. Each exhibitor is responsible for the completed entries to be sent in. One entry form must be filled out per species (one for steer). Entry forms must be complete to be considered an entry.
10. Steer classes will be shown Friday, October 12, 2001, beginning at 9:00 a.m.
11. Exhibitors **MUST** designate if the steer will be sold when the steer is weighed in on October 11, 2001.
12. Exhibitors will furnish feed for all their animals during the Fair until animals are turned over to their buyers at 9:00 a.m., Sunday, October 14, 2001. **All animals and equipment must be removed from the barn by 12:00 p.m.**
13. All steers entered in the Junior Market Steer show must be tied in the area of the Livestock Barn designated for Junior Market Steers during the fair. Premiums on steers tied in other areas will be forfeited.

14. All exhibitors are automatically entered in the Beef Super Showperson Competition. All exhibitors receiving a Super Showperson Award, in this division, are eligible to return for the Showmanship Championship. A separate Showmanship Championship will be held for Junior and Senior exhibitors, immediately following the last class in the Jr. Beef Heifer Show. Refer to the Beef Super Showperson Award section.
15. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation in exhibition animals, including the use of steroids and other drugs, as well as lifting, dyeing or filling under the skin, will be considered fraud and deception. The North Carolina State Fair Management reserves the right to test the grand and reserve champion steer, and to conduct other random testing as deemed appropriate. The grand and reserve champions may be sampled at the fair. Exhibitors involved in any such treatment will be barred from exhibition at this Fair, and all Fairs holding membership in the International Association of Fairs and Exposition will be notified.
16. The Superintendent reserves the right to inspect the cattle premises at anytime between May 15 and October 11, 2001.
17. Any question not covered by these rules will be ruled on by the Superintendent. EXCEPT AS NOTED, ALL GENERAL RULES OF THE FAIR AND OF THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION WILL APPLY AND GOVERN THIS DEPARTMENT.

**RULES ON ENTERING:**

#### CONTEST COMPOSITION:

Skillathon encourages youth to expand their livestock knowledge and participation by blending knowledge and skills acquired in livestock judging, demonstrations and care and exhibition of animals into one activity. It recognizes youth for their total involvement in and comprehension of knowledge of the livestock industry. The contest is composed of five major areas:

1. **Written Exam:** One 25 question written exam for each age division. Questions cover nutrition, health, breeding, management, genetics, current issues, and showmanship. The exam is worth 100 points.
2. **Visual Identification:** Each age division visually identifies twenty-five (25) different items of feedstuffs, breeds, meat cuts, tools, and various livestock equipment. Contestants may not handle the items. Twenty (20) seconds are allotted for identifying each item. Worth a total of 200 points.
3. **Hay Judging:** Rank a class of four hay samples with forage analysis information. This will be worth 50 points. Answer five questions about the hay for a total of 25 points.
4. **Meat Judging:** Rank a class of 4 meat cuts. This will be worth 50 points. Answer five questions about the meats for a total of 25 points.

#### ELIGIBILITY:

1. Each contestant must have reached his/her ninth (9) birthday on or before January 1 of the current year and must not have reached his/her nineteenth (19) birthday prior to January 1 of the current year.
2. Junior division is open only to those youths who have reached their ninth (9) birthday on or before January 1 of the current year and who have not reached their 13th birthday before January 1 of the current year.
3. Senior Division is open only to those youth who have reached their 14th birthday as of January 1 of the current year and who have not reached their 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year.



- Individuals who have enrolled in a post secondary university, college, junior college or technical institute beyond the first semester or quarter of the current year are not eligible for participation.
- Youth need not own or exhibit livestock in order to participate.
- Individuals who have participated in the Regional or National Skillathon Contests, as team members or as alternates, are not eligible to compete in the Skillathon activities in North Carolina.
- Cross-county line teams are allowed only if teams are trained by a shared livestock or 4-H agent.
- Contestants must be residents of North Carolina.

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- Each county may enter an unlimited number of senior and/or junior teams and individuals. Counties must designate teams and individuals by age categories -- Senior or Junior Divisions.
- The entry form must be completed in its entirety, and postmarked by the deadline date before it will be accepted for registration purposes.
- A team will consist of 3 or 4 members. The team score will be a total of the 3 high individual scores from the designated team.
- Contestants will be divided into groups for the contest. They will remain in this groups throughout the entire contest.
- The no-talking rule will be strictly enforced. Contestants may not talk to each other. Questions for information or clarification of instructions should be directed to group leaders or officials. If contestants are caught talking or cheating, they will be excused from the contest.

### **SCORING:**

Total individual scores will consist of combined scores from: visual identification, written exam, meat evaluation, and hay evaluation. Ties will be broken accordingly:

- Highest score on the written exam.
- Combined scores of the written exam plus hay evaluation score.
- Combined scores of the written exam, hay evaluation score, plus the visual identification scores.
- Combined scores of the written exam, hay and meats evaluation score, visual identification plus the meats and breed identification score.

The team score will be a total of the 3 high individual scores from the designated team.

### **AWARDS:**

- Each participant will receive a Skillathon certificate after completion of the entire event.
- The top 15 individuals in the Junior and the Senior Division will receive placing ribbons and premiums.
- The top individual in the Junior and Senior Divisions will also receive plaques.
- The top 5 teams in the Junior and Senior Divisions will be recognized with ribbons and premiums.
- The top 2 teams will also receive plaques.

1. Use a separate entry form for Junior Ewe and Junior Market Lamb entries.
2. Junior ewes must be checked in at the sheep barn between 12:00 and 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 11, 2001. Purebred ewes must be registered and be accompanied by the registration certificates. NOTE: No pens can be used for equipment or feed storage. Please put at least three sheep per pen, and keep feed and equipment in your trailer or vehicle.
3. Exhibitors must be residents of North Carolina and be under 19 years of age as of October 12, 2001.
4. Completed entry forms will include the name, social security number and telephone number of the exhibitor for each animal. **Check the entry carefully before mailing.** No substituting of animals will be allowed, and exhibitors cannot switch animals at check-in.
5. Exhibitors must have worked with the sheep they are showing for at least 60 days before the show date.
6. Exhibitors must have trained and fitted their entries. Major fitting should be done prior to arrival at the fair.
7. All ewes entered in the Junior Ewe Show must be accompanied by an official Health Certificate. (See Health Regulations)
8. Each exhibitor is limited to two ewes. Each ewe can only be entered in one class.
9. Ewes must be shown as individuals. If a junior exhibitor has more than one ewe per class, the second ewe will be shown by a junior exhibitor approved by the superintendent prior to the show (8:00 am Friday). Substitute exhibitors must wear a special exhibitor number card issued by the superintendent. If someone other than the exhibitor listed in the program (or an approved substitute exhibitor) brings a sheep to the ring, they will not be allowed to show (the lamb will be deleted from the class). **No bracing of ewes during show.**
10. Class size will be limited to 20 head. If the number of entries exceeds 20 head, additional classes will be formed based on age of lambs. If birthdate is listed by month only, it will be assumed that the lamb was born on the first day of the month.
11. All ewes entered in commercial classes will be mouthed at registration. Junior lambs must have all temporary teeth in place at the time of the show. Commercial senior (class NB109) and yearling (class NB108) lambs may have one pair of permanent incisors. Only lambs entered in class B107 may be shown with a second set of permanent incisors. Age of ewes shown in purebred classes will be obtained from registration certificates. Superintendent will rule on all other questions regarding age.

12. Purebred ewes are eligible to show in appropriate classes in the open sheep show provided they:
  - (A) Are entered in the open show. *Use a separate entry form for the open show.*
  - (B) Are accompanied by an official health certificate as required in the open show.
13. Ewes may be shown either with or without a halter.
14. The Junior Wool Breed Show is Department SB.

8. Fleece must be dry at weighing, and lambs must weigh between 90 and 145 pounds. **No reweighs will be allowed.**
9. Lamb show entries must be made on different entry form than sheep in open show, or junior ewe show.
10. Class size will be limited to 20 head. If the number of entries exceeds 20 the entries will be divided to form additional classes at the discretion of the Superintendent.
11. Major fitting should be done prior to arrival at the Fair.
12. The closing date for entries shall be September 15, 2001. Entries must include Social Security Number.
13. Lambs will be shown Friday, October 12, 2001, beginning at 1:00 p.m.

### SHEEP SUPER SHOWPERSON AWARD

The objective of the Sheep Super Showperson Award is to provide recognition to young people who have developed proper showmanship skills while working on their livestock projects. These skills will be evaluated separately from the quality of the animal shown, and will be judged while the youth exhibits an animal in the Junior Market Lamb or Junior Ewe show. The Judge will select the youths solely on their showmanship ability.

Exhibitors are automatically entered into this showmanship competition. Exhibitors must be showing animals they entered to be eligible for the award. Youth that show for another exhibitor will not be eligible.

Recipients of the Super Showperson Award will be recognized at the conclusion of each class. A **one time** monetary award of \$25 and a Sheep Super Showperson pin will be provided by the North Carolina State Fair to each exhibitor honored. There will not be a set number of youths recognized. In other words, no minimum or maximum quotas exist. The Judge will simply recognize all youths that are deserving of the Super Showperson Award.

**COMPETITION:** Open to animals registered or recorded in the American Dairy Goat Association, American Goat Society, or the Canadian Society.

**ENTRIES:** Must be postmarked no later than September 15, 2001. Entry fee is \$3.00 per animal. There are no pen fees. The right is reserved to reject entries after all available space has been taken. No late entries will be accepted.

**ANIMALS MUST BE IN PLACE:** Friday, October 19, **at 5:00 p.m.**, NO EXCEPTIONS. Animals must be checked in with Show Secretary by 7:00 p.m.

**JUDGING BEGINS:** 8:00 p.m. Friday, October 19 with Youth Showmanship; Saturday, October 20 with the Youth Dairy Goat Show starting at 9:00 a.m. The Open Junior Doe Show starts immediately following the Youth Show. All Open Senior Does will be judged Sunday, October 21 starting at 9:00 a.m.

**LOCATION:** KELLEY BUILDING

**ARRIVAL OF EXHIBITS:** Absolutely no pens will be available before 10:00 a.m. Friday, October 19, 2001. No tack pens will be provided.

**NEW - PRE-SHOW COVERED DISH DINNER:** Starting at 6:00 p.m. Friday, October 19, 2001 ending at 8:00 p.m. prior to youth showmanship. Bring your favorite dish and share in the fellowship.

**RELEASE OF EXHIBITS:** All exhibitors both out-of-state and in-state not requested to stay will be released at the conclusion of the Open Senior Doe Show. Anyone leaving prior to release forfeits all premiums. Any exhibitor (and animals) unable to leave upon release must make arrangements with the NC State Fair and Dairy Goat Superintendent to stay overnight. Overnight stay will have to be in some area other than the Kelley Building. The NC State Fair and the Dairy Goat Superintendent are not responsible for any personal losses including animals.

**HEALTH REGULATIONS FOR GOATS**

All goats must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued within 60 days prior to October 19, 2001. The health certificate shall state that the goats are clinically free of any infectious or communicable disease. The health certificate shall include a description of each animal including age, sex, breed, name, tattoo, and color or marking. If the goats are arriving from out of state, they must

be accompanied by a health paper stating that they have tested negative for both TB and Brucellosis within the last 60 days unless from a certified and accredited herd.

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

1. All entries must comply with both ADGA and NC State Fair rules. Be thoroughly familiar with both. **CHANGES HAVE BEEN MADE IN THE DAIRY GOAT SHOW. It is your responsibility as an exhibitor to read and be familiar with all rules!**
2. Be sure to use the official entry form and include the animal's tattoo. List the class number in which the animal will be shown. Also, indicate any group classes to be entered. Any animals competing in a group class must have competed in her individual class.
3. Substitutions of animals will be allowed only within a breed and class.
4. A registration paper or a stamped duplicate (for animals under 6 months of age) is required for each animal. Proof of ownership shall be the name on the registration paper or recordation certificate. **No signed transfers will be accepted.**
5. No exhibitor shall receive more than 2 premiums per class. Except, group classes in which exhibitor is limited to 1 premium. This is in accordance to NC State Fair rules.
6. Entry in the Champion Challenge class is open to permanent champions only. Qualifications must be by registration/recordation or certificate by the American Dairy Goat Association. Champion Challenge competitors shall **not** be foreclosed from group or progeny classes. Shift from regular classes to Champion Challenge may be made, with proof of qualification, any time before the beginning of judging of the breed.
7. When filling in the entry form the Dept. Letter is O, Subdept. is A - the class number depends on the breed and the age of the animal. For example, a 6 year old Saanen would use class number 160 under class number on the entry form. Please fill out all spaces for each animal to be entered on the entry form.
8. **A SEPARATE ENTRY FORM MUST BE USED FOR THE YOUTH SHOW (OB), JUNIOR DOE SHOW (OA), AND THE SENIOR DOE SHOW (OA).** Check appropriate boxes on the entry form. **Write Youth on entry for Youth Show.** There are forms in the back of this catalog. An exhibitor who wants to show in all three shows, **must fill out entry forms for each show**-Open Junior Doe Show, Open Senior Doe Show and Youth Show.
9. If entering more than one breed, please group all animals by breed.
10. **BE SURE TO INCLUDE YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER ON YOUR ENTRY TO RECEIVE PREMIUMS.**
11. The breeds to be shown and the show order will be as follows: Saanen, Toggenburg, Alpine, Lamancha, Nubian, Oberhasli, and Recorded Grades.
12. The health regulations of the Veterinary Division of the NC Dept. of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. **Be sure to read these under "Rules and Regulations of the Livestock Division" before entering. Any questionable health problems will be referred to the show committee and/or the State Veterinarian. Animals with obvious abscesses (opened or unopened), ringworm, soremouth or any other contagious disease WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IN THE BARN.**

3. List the class number in which the animal will be shown and included any group classes an animal is to enter. In order to be shown in a group class, the animal must have competed in her individual class.
4. Open to all exhibitors under age 21, prior to the day of the show.
5. The exhibitor must be the bona fide owner of the exhibit on the show day or have taken possession of the animal at birth. Proof of ownership shall be the name on the registration or recordation certificate. No signed transfers will be accepted. No family or farm ownerships will be considered for the Youth Show.
6. Each class is limited to 3 animals per exhibitor. The exhibitor must show one of these animals. The exhibitor may designate up to 2 Junior Handlers, with the approval of the Show Superintendent and Show Secretary.
7. Substitutions of animals will be allowed only on a within breed and class basis.
8. A registration paper or a stamped duplicate (for animals under the age of six months) is required for each animal.
9. The Health Regulations of the Veterinary Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. **BE SURE TO READ THESE UNDER "RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION" BEFORE ENTERING.**
10. When filling in the Entry Form, the Dept. Letter is OB, the class number depends on the class and breed shown. For example, a Recorded Grade 1 yr. old milker would use class number OB244 on the entry form, the Breed is A, AOP, L, N, or RG and the sex is F. Fill the entry form in completely for each animal.

Indicate on the form the total number of animals you will exhibit. Payment of \$2.00 per animal entered must accompany your application. Pen space will be assigned by the Superintendent. Please indicate on entry form if your animals need to be penned adjacent to another exhibitor.

List the class number, as indicated in the premium list, for which each entry is made. Do not make entries in the Championship classes. Indicate if you plan to make entries in the flock classes, but it is not necessary to name the animals which will make up your flock entry until after the judging of the individual classes. No exhibitor may win more than two premium monies in any one class. Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each of the group classes. Only one person per sheep is permitted in the show ring except in the exhibition of yearling, fall lambs and group classes.

The Health Regulations of the Veterinary Division of the NC Department of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. **BE SURE TO READ THESE UNDER "RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION"** before entering or competing in this department.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS**

1. Junior ewes must arrive and be checked in at the sheep barn between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 17, 2001. Pen space will be assigned by the Superintendent(s). Please indicate on entry blank if your animals need to be penned adjacent to another exhibitor.
2. Exhibitors must be residents of North Carolina and under 19 years of age as of October 17, 2001.
3. Entries must be postmarked in the State Fair Office by September 15, 2001. Completed entry forms will include the name, social security number and telephone number of the exhibitor of each animal. Please fill out a separate entry form for each exhibitor. If also exhibiting in the open show, there must be a separate entry form filled out for that show. CHECK YOUR ENTRIES CAREFULLY BEFORE MAILING.
4. Ewes must be owned by the exhibitor at least 60 days before the show date. Ownership of purebred ewes will be verified by registration certificates, a copy of which will be sent with the entry form. Ownership of commercial ewes must be verified by a signed statement from the parent or guardian, to accompany the entry form. Enclose a written statement (signed and dated) that states: "I certify that \_\_\_\_\_(name of exhibitor) has owned his/her sheep to be shown at the NC State Fair for at least 60 days prior to the show date." Purebred ewes with no registration papers will be shown as commercial ewes. No substitutions will be allowed and exhibitors cannot switch animals at check in.
5. Exhibitors must have trained and fitted their own entries.
6. All ewes entered in the Junior Ewe Show must be accompanied by an official Health Certificate. (See Health Regulations)
7. Animals to be judged 60% on wool and 40% on conformation.
8. All animals must have a MINIMUM of 2 inches of fleece (except necks, legs & bellies).
9. Exhibitor is responsible for informing the judge of the breed or breed cross of animal. All purebred animals should be tagged with breed registry tag. Crossbred animals must have a farm tag. All animals not so tagged will be tagged at check in.
10. Exhibitor is responsible for entering crossbred animals in appropriate wool grade division.
11. Senior ewe lamb classes may be added if numbers indicate. Please indicate on entry if you have a senior ewe lamb (born 9-1-00/12-31-00) that you would like to enter. You will be notified if enough entries are received to form a class.
12. Each exhibitor is limited to showing one ewe per class. Entries may be made for no more than two ewes per class.
13. Ewes must be shown as individuals. If a junior exhibitor has more than one ewe per class, the second ewe will be shown by a junior exhibitor approved by the

superintendents. A junior exhibitor showing a ewe for another exhibitor will not be eligible for a Super Show Person award.

14. Class size will be limited to 20 head. If the number of entries exceeds 20 head, additional classes will be formed at the discretion of the superintendent.

15. All ewes will be mouthed at check in. Age of purebred ewes will be obtained from registration certificates. All junior lambs must have all temporary teeth in place at the time of the show. Commercial yearling ewes which have shed their second pair of temporary teeth will be shown subject to approval of the superintendent. Superintendent will rule on all other questions regarding age.

16. Ewes are eligible to show in appropriate classes in the open sheep show provided they:

a. Are entered in the open show by the deadline for entries. Use a separate entry form for the open show.

b. Are accompanied by an official health certificate as required in the open show.

17. Ewes may be shown either with or without a halter. Major fitting should be done prior to arrival at the fair.

18. Jr. Ewes will be shown at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, October 18, 2001.

19. Exhibitors will feed and care for their ewes during the fair. All animals will be released from the sheep barn at 8:00 AM Friday, October 19, 2001. ALL EWES MUST BE REMOVED FROM PENS BY 10:00 AM ON FRIDAY.

20. ANY QUESTIONS NOT COVERED BY THESE RULES WILL BE RULED ON BY THE SUPERINTENDENTS.

21. EXCEPT AS NOTED, ALL GENERAL RULES OF THE FAIR AND THE LIVESTOCK DIVISION WILL APPLY AND GOVERN THIS DEPARTMENT.

## 22. SUPER SHOWPERSON AWARD

Junior Ewe (Wool Breeds) Super Showperson Award

The objective of the sheep Super Showperson Award is to provide recognition to youth that have developed proper showmanship skills through work with their livestock projects. These skills will be evaluated separately from the quality of the animal shown while the youth exhibits an animal in the Junior Ewe (Wool Breeds) show. The judge will select the youth(s) solely on their showmanship ability.

Youth are automatically entered into this showmanship competition.

Youth must exhibit the animal they entered to be fully eligible for the award. Youth that show for another exhibitor will NOT be eligible.

Recipients of the Super Showperson Award will be recognized at the conclusion of each class. A one time monetary award of \$25 (in combination if also showing in Jr. Mkt. Lamb and Jr. Ewe Show) and a Super Showperson pin will be provided by the NC State Fair to each exhibitor honored. Youth may be recognized in more than one class if circumstances merit the award. More than one youth may be recognized in each class.

### SHOWMANSHIP \$25 (and Pin)

23. North Carolina Born & Bred Awards-Champion and Reserve Champion North Carolina Born & Bred Awards will be given to the highest placing qualified ewes in the junior show. To be considered, a statement of nomination for this award must accompany the entry form and must be signed by the breeder of the ewe.

1. Eligibility: Only animals registered in a recognized Association may be shown in official International Boer Goat Association Sanctioned shows. Only International Boer Goat Association registered animals may be awarded points. If animal is not International Boer Goat Association registered, owner has the option to register winning animal within five business days with International Boer Goat Association and still be eligible to be awarded points. If winning animal is not International Boer Goat Association registered within allotted time, points will not be awarded.
2. The base date for computing ages for entries shall be the date the animals are to be judged.
3. A registration certificate is required for all animals.
4. No copies of registration or stamped duplicate of official registration will be accepted by the show officials unless the animal is under six (6) months of age.
5. The documents specified above as the requirements for that age animal to be shown must be presented to the show secretary for verification before the judging begins (check-in time).
6. Proof of ownership shall be the name on the registration document. Persons showing animals whose registration certificates have signed transfers that have not been processed by the IBGA Office must show those animals as agent for the owner on IBGA records.
7. An exhibitor shall not present an animal to be shown under a judge from whom it was purchased or possession taken within 90 days of show.
8. An exhibitor shall not present an animal to be shown under a judge who is his/her immediate family or employer or employee.

9. An exhibitor that is showing an animal with a microchip as permanent identification is required to provide a microchip reader for verification of animal identity.

10. If an animal is registered in the IBGA, that registration number must be listed on the entry form.

11. Any animal that has attained the "Platinum Champion" status or has received sufficient points to reach the "Platinum Champion" status is ineligible to show in IBGA sanctioned or otherwise sponsored events. These animals are eligible to be displayed at any IBGA events.

12. An exhibitor shall not knowingly show an animal that does not meet eligibility requirements.

13. The IBGA Judge's Committee reserves the right to send Trainee or Apprentice Judges to serve under a Senior Judge at any Sanctioned Show for training and/or educational purposes.

14. It is the responsibility of the show secretary to have a copy of these rules available at all times in case any questions arise during the course of the show.

Junior meat goats must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to the show. Each animal will be allowed to compete in only one show, (example: market goats may not be shown in the commercial doe classes).

**CHECK IN AND WEIGHING:** Junior meat goats will be weighed, tagged, and checked in between 12:00 noon and 5:00 p.m. on Monday, October 15, 2001 in the Kelley Building.

**NOTE:** *The Kelley Building will be in the process of being cleaned on Sunday night and Monday morning. Goats will not be allowed in the building until after cleaning is completed.*

**DISPLAY:** Junior meat goats will be released on Tuesday, October 16, 2001 at 8:00 p.m. Junior meat goats leaving prior to release time will not receive any premium.

**CLASSES:** Market classes will be determined by ascending weights with a maximum of 15 animals per class. Junior commercial doe classes will be determined by age according to teeth. Kids with all baby teeth will be classed separate from does with at least one baby tooth missing. There will be a maximum of 15 does per class.

**HEALTH:** All goats must be accompanied by an official health certificate. (See details under Livestock Health Regulations.)

**MILEAGE COMPENSATION:** The State Fair Management will pay mileage \$.10 per animal, per mile for goats exhibited in the Junior Meat Goat Show based on the one-way distance between the home county seat and Raleigh.

### INFORMATION FOR POULTRY EXHIBITORS

**ENTRIES CLOSE:** *All Exhibitors please note!* Entries will close when coop spaces are filled or Sept. 15, 2001. In 2001, entries will be limited to 250 birds total from any exhibitor, family or firm, including the total from both the Junior and Senior Show. PLEASE NOTE! Limitations in using space at the fairgrounds dictate that the format for the Poultry Show again in 2001 be changed and split into two groups of poultry for showing.

First Show—Birds Must Be In Place: Thursday, October 11 at 5:00 p.m. This will include all Junior Exhibitors Class "Y" Poultry Youth Class, the standard chickens Class "A" Large chickens, and the turkeys Class "E". These birds will be released Tuesday at 4:00 p.m., October 16, 2001.

Second Show—Birds will be accepted from 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 17, 2001. This show includes the bantams Class "B" chickens, the ducks Class "C" waterfowl, and the geese Class "D" waterfowl. These birds will be released at 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 21, 2001.

**BIRDS MUST BE IN PLACE:** Thursday, October 11, at 5:00 p.m.

**JUDGING STARTS:** Friday, October 12, at 9:00 a.m. for The First Show: Jr. Show - Standard Chickens and Turkeys.

**JUDGING STARTS:** Thursday, October 18 at 9:00 a.m. for The Second Show: Bantams, Ducks and Geese.

**NOTE: American Bantam Association (ABA) and American Poultry Association (APA) State Meets have been applied for the 2001 N.C. State Fair Poultry Show.**

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

*(See Poultry Exhibitors Certificate in the Back of this Book)*

Except in cases of conflict, in which the following Rules and Regulations will prevail, the General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. **BE SURE TO READ THESE IN THE FRONT OF THE BOOK BEFORE ENTERING OR COMPETING IN THIS DEPARTMENT.** Some - but not all - are repeated here for emphasis, and other of the following Rules and Regulations apply only to this department.

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY!** The right is reserved to reject entries received after all space is taken.

Official printed forms must be used in making applications for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use separate forms for entries in other departments of the FAIR. *Be sure to fill out the application form completely, accurately and legibly.* Give your rural route number, post office box number, or city street address, and zip code - telephone number.

In filling out the form, write "Poultry" or department letter "Q" in the first column headed: "Dept." In the next column headed: "Class no." write the letter "A" if your bird is entered in the "Standard Breed Show," the letter "B" if entered in the regular classification, and the letter "C" if entered in the "Miscellaneous" Classification, etc. In the third column, headed "Premium List No." write in the number shown for the sex and age of the breed and variety you are exhibiting. For instance, if you were entering a Barred-Plymouth Rock pullet in the Show, you would enter the number "4" as indicated in the premium list under the column headed "Premium List No."

In the wide column headed "Description of Article" write the breed, if large fowl or Bantams, and variety of your bird exactly as they appear in the premium list. Next enter age and sex (Cock, Hen, Cockerel or Pullet). In the column headed: "Leg Band No." **BE SURE TO LIST THIS EXACTLY AS THE BIRD WILL BE BANDED WHEN BROUGHT TO THE FAIR.** Important: **LIST ONLY ONE BIRD ON EACH LINE OF THE APPLICATION FORM.** Space cannot be reserved until receipt of the coop fee, and, remember: The right is reserved to reject entries after all available space is taken. A coop fee of \$2.00 for each bird exhibited must accompany your application form.

All birds must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner, who must have owned the birds for at least 60 days before the closing date for entries. Owners and breeders must maintain a breeding establishment sufficient to raise the birds so exhibited.

All birds are entered at the risk of the owner, and the State Fair management will not be responsible for any loss or damage, but will exercise all possible vigilance in the care of exhibits. No one will be allowed to handle fowl on display except the owners

and officials of the show, without permission of the directors. The right is reserved to coop two or more birds of the same variety, and belonging to the same person, together if absolutely necessary. In no case will two male birds be placed in the same coop.

The American Standard of Perfection will be the guide of the judges in awarding premium. The premiums will be paid only on standard varieties listed in this catalog, and then only to worthy specimens. To win first premium, a bird must score at least 88 points; for second premium, 87 points. For less than 87 points, third and fourth prizes will be awarded.

The decision of the judges will be final. Protest will be entertained only when addressed to the Division Director of the Division III by noon of the day following the award, and then only when accompanied by a protest fee of \$5.00. Basis for protest: (1) Placing a disqualified bird; (2) Fraud; and (3) Clerical error. This fee will be forfeited unless protest is sustained by a majority of the judging staff and officials of the show.

After the judging, the management will endeavor to place on the coops any advertising material supplied by the exhibitor for his coop.

Mail entries, make checks for coop fees payable to, and address requests for additional entry application forms and further information, to N.C. STATE FAIR, 1025 Blue Ridge Blvd., Raleigh, N.C. 27607.

### POULTRY

All poultry exhibited at the North Carolina State Fair shall have been in the possession of the exhibitor for sixty days or more prior to the date of the Fair. Exhibitors will fill out the "Poultry Exhibitor Certificate" in the back of this book.

All chickens and turkeys for exhibition at the Fair will originate from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days of admission to the Fair. The test requirements may be satisfied by a negative test conducted by an official state tester at the time the birds are brought to the Fair. The fee for pullorum-typhoid testing at the fairgrounds will be eight cents per bird, with a minimum fee of \$1.00 per exhibitor.

No poultry shall have received a live virus vaccine within 45 days prior to entering the Fair. It is recommended that all birds be vaccinated for laryngotracheitis with a modified live virus vaccine at least 45 days and not more than one year before the show.

All chickens and turkeys must be identified with numbered tamper-proof bands. Bands placed on birds tested at the fairground by state testers will satisfy this requirement. Poultry entered at the Fair are subject to examination (including blood test and swabs by a representative of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.) **Birds will not be accepted which are infected with or showing any clinical signs of an infectious or communicable disease, or are infested with lice and/or mites.**

Coops used in transporting live birds to the fair shall not be allowed inside the exhibit building.

Out-of-State birds will not be admitted this year.

## YOUTH - MARKET TURKEYS

### Rules and Regulations

- Birds entered in the Market Tom Turkey Class **MUST** have been hatched on or after Wednesday, May 23, 2001 (not over 20 weeks of age on show day) and have been owned and cared for by exhibitor from the age of 48 hours after hatching.
1. In 2001 all market turkeys will be provided by the NCSU Poultry Science Department and will be banded for identification.
  2. Exhibitors may make only one (1) entry in the Market Tom Turkey Class.
  3. Exhibitors **MUST** show NPIP hatchery papers at check-in, verifying hatching date.
  4. Market Tom Turkeys must be banded for identification immediately upon arrival at the Fair. There is no weight limit.
  5. Market Tom Turkeys will be penned by the Superintendents in charge.
  6. **HANDLING OF BIRDS BY ANYONE (OTHER THAN THE EXHIBITOR) AFTER THEY ARE IN CAGES IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED, EXCEPT WITH THE PERMISSION OF THE SUPERINTENDENTS OF THE SHOW.**
  7. Market Tom Turkeys will show in order of entry number.
  8. Entries in Market Turkey Class may be any type of Commercial Tom Turkey. Turkeys may be de-beaked, de-toed, or subjected to any practice generally accepted in the commercial production of meat type turkeys.
  9. On judging day all Junior Exhibitors must be present to bring their turkey to the judge. The Junior Exhibitors will be assisted by contract employees of the N.C. State Fair or other Junior Fair Exhibitors. **No other people besides the Junior Exhibitors and Fair Staff will be allowed in the cage area or around the judging during the show.**
  10. Classes will be limited to 15 turkeys per class.
  11. A maximum of 8 classes and be housed.

Interpretation of these, and other rules of this department will be invested in the Department Superintendent, the Judge and the Division Director. Their decisions will be final, except in the case of official protest as explained in the General Rules and Regulations of the State Fair.

This show is sanctioned and conducted in cooperation with the North Carolina Rabbit Breeders Association. However, membership in or registration of animals with the North Carolina or American Associations is not required to enter or compete.

### ENTRIES

**MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY.** Due to housing restrictions of 518 coops, the right is reserved to reject applications received after all available space is taken.

Official printed forms must be used in making applications for entry. Two will be found in the back of this book. Additional copies are available upon request. Use separate forms for entries in other departments.

Be sure to fill in the application form completely, accurately and legibly. Give your social security number, rural route number, post office box number, or city street address, and zip code. Indicate if this is an Open or Youth Show entry.

List the department letter "R" and premium number under which each entry is made. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT. For instance, if you were entering a Senior Doe American White Rabbit in the individual class, you would list "R-11" in the column headed "Premium List No." on the entry form (SEE PREMIUM LIST). Stock brought to the showroom by the owner and arriving sick will be returned to the exhibitor at check-in time and for the purpose of judging will be considered "Not Shown" and entry fee forfeited. Stock shipped in for exhibition which arrives sick or any stock which becomes ill during the course of the exhibition will be removed and placed under the care of a veterinarian.

Shipments of stock must be prepaid. The Fair management will not be responsible for any shipping, drayage or other transportation charges to the Fair. Shipments should be addressed to: SUPERINTENDENT, RABBIT DEPARTMENT, at the above address. Return shipments will be made collect by the Fair, without drayage charge, if directed by the exhibitor on his application form. Shipping crates should be strongly constructed and have the owner's name and address plainly and permanently marked thereon. The Fair management will not be responsible for any loss or damage. Each coop has an automatic waterer. IF YOUR RABBITS ARE NOT ACCUSTOMED TO AUTOMATIC WATERERS—PLEASE BRING A CONTAINER FOR EACH RABBIT.

No person will be allowed to handle exhibits without permissions of the department directors. Any exhibitor interfering with, attempting to influence, criticizing, or otherwise causing delay and confusion during the judging, will be barred from further competition and will forfeit all award and premiums previously won. The judging will be done with an enclosed arena and only officials of the show and their designated helpers will be permitted therein.

Each animal must have a permanent ear mark, which must be listed on the entry form. No adhesive tape or pencil marks will be accepted.

The right is reserved to substitute another judge in the case the judge listed is

unable to officiate. Each animal must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner, otherwise exhibitor forfeits all entry fees and premiums.

**NO SUBSTITUTIONS OF ANIMALS ALLOWED EXCEPT IN SAME BREED, CLASS, AND SEX.**

## HEALTH REGULATIONS

### Rabbits

The coops are equipped with an automatic watering system. The feed for the rabbits is supplied by the Fair. An attendant is available at all times to feed and care for the rabbits.

A. The health regulations of the Veterinary Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture will be enforced. They are:

1. All rabbits will be presented for examination before being placed in the show. The Show Veterinarian will not accept rabbits infected with or showing any clinical symptoms of infectious or communicable disease. Rabbits developing symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases during the show will be placed in isolation and shall not be removed for purpose of exhibiting.
2. Boxes used in transporting live rabbits to the Fair will not be allowed to remain inside the exhibit building during the Fair. They may be brought into the building in order to place the rabbits on exhibition, and again to pick up the rabbits Monday morning, October 22, 2001.

B. Any animal which does not display a good condition of health and vigor or is deemed unsuitable for public exhibition may be refused at check-in and for the purpose of judging will be considered "Not Shown" and entry fee forfeited.

C. The litters in Doe and Litter classes must be 6 to 8 weeks of age.

### CLASS "A"

As indicated by the premium list, juniors (under six months), intermediates(6-8 months) and seniors (over 8 months) will be judged by sex, in each breed of the individual classes, except in the small breeds in which the American Rabbit and Cavy Breeders Association does not recognize as intermediate class. In these smaller breeds, the judging will be of juniors (under six months) and seniors (over 6 months). In addition, there will be competition for pre-juniors (under 3 months of age) in the following breeds: Beveren, California, Champagne, Checkered Giant, American Chinchilla, Giant Chinchilla, Cinnamon, Creme d'Argent, Flemish Giant, Hotot, New Zealand, Palomino, Satin, and Silver Fox. Doe with Litter Classes will be judged in each breed.



4. In the first column list the department name (Culinary) or the department letter ("W"). In the next column list the class number ("1" for Food Preservation Products, or "2" for Breads, Cakes, Cookies and Candies). Next list the item number under which the entry is being made ("W-2" is the item number under which to enter pint or quart jars of Applesauce). Finally, in the wide column on the form give the description of the article to be exhibited, using the exact wording of the premium list. Use a separate line for each item entered.
5. All entries must have been prepared by the exhibitor within the year, October 2000-2001. Anything that has been entered in a previous State Fair will be disqualified.

6. Only one individual in a household may make an entry under a premium number; and only one entry per individual is allowed under each premium number.
7. An individual may not enter more than 15 items in **Class 1: Food Preservation Products**, and may not enter more than 10 items in **Class 2—Breads, Cakes, Cookies, and Candies**.
8. The same product may not be shared for entry by more than one individual. Violators (all individuals) will be disqualified.

## CLASS 1—Food Preservation Products

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. In order to award premiums on a quality basis, all containers except canned fruits and vegetables will be opened. Any canned fruit or vegetable that resembles a commercial product may be opened for testing.
2. EXHIBITS WILL BE RULED OUT WHEN NOT IN STANDARD CANNING JARS OF THE SPECIFIED SIZE. Please include the ring with two-piece lid jars.
3. Unless an article is of good quality, no premiums will be awarded.
4. All products must be processed according to recognized safe methods found in the current editions of the USDA *Complete Guide to Home Canning*, the *Ball Blue Book* or the *Kerr Home Canning Books*.
5. All jars, except wine, and dried fruits and vegetables, must be labeled as to content, processing method (pressure canner or boiling water bath) and processing time. **ENTRIES WILL BE DISQUALIFIED IF NOT LABELED.**
6. A Best of Show ribbon will be given to the best Adult and Junior entry in Class 1.

### CRITERIA FOR JUDGING:

- I. Color ..... 20 points
  - that of natural fruit or vegetable.
- II. Liquid ..... 10 points

The fruits are suspended in a clear syrup that is the consistency of honey or soft jelly. These products should be filled to within 1/4 inch of top of standard canning jars and must be processed in a boiling water bath for airtight seal (no paraffin).

### CRITERIA FOR JUDGING

- I. Shape ..... 10 points
  - small fruit should be whole and have original shape as nearly as possible; larger fruits should maintain sliced shape
- II. Clearness and Color ..... 25 points
  - fruit should be translucent and not too dark; liquid should be clear.

- IV. Texture ..... 10 points
  - tender, but firm and plump
- V. Pack and Fill ..... 5 points
  - arrangement of fruit with reference to symmetry of jar; filled to 1/4" of top, water bath processed
- VI. Consistency ..... 10 points
  - juice should be of honey consistency or slightly jellied
- VII. Proportion of Syrup ..... 10 points
  - about one-third as much syrup as fruit

Butters are pureed fruit cooked to a smooth consistency. These products should be filled to 1/4" of top of standard canning jars and must be processed in a boiling water bath for airtight seal (no paraffin).

  - tender fruit with smooth texture
- II. Flavor ..... 35 points
  - natural fruit flavor, not overpowered with added ingredients or spices
- III. Consistency and Texture ..... 30 points

- IV. Color and Clearness ..... 10 points
  - shiny fruit color; marmalades clear with suspended citrus

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A Best of Show ribbon will be given to the best Adult entry and to each of the three Junior categories in Class 2.
2. Enter 1/2 cake only (unless otherwise noted) except for decorated cakes. No refrigerated cakes will be accepted. This includes those with frostings containing cream cheese, heavy cream, and/or egg yolk.
3. Place cakes on pieces of **very heavy** cardboard which has been covered with foil or wax paper. Cardboard should extend one inch beyond the cake on all sides.
4. Punch a hole in the cardboard base so an entry tag can be tied through it. An entry tag will be provided when the entry is delivered.
5. Place the unwrapped entry in a large, clear food grade plastic bag (plastic wrap is not acceptable), with the entry tag extending outside the bag. You must supply your own plastic bag. None will be available at the Fair entry office.
6. Only 1/2 loaf of yeast bread or quick bread may be entered.
7. Place breads on a heavy paper plate or piece of heavy cardboard. They should be in clear food grade plastic bags (plastic wrap is not acceptable), with an attached entry tag extending outside the bag.
8. Place cookies and candies on heavy paper plates. Do not use cardboard. Put the plate into a clear food grade plastic bag (plastic wrap is not acceptable). Attach entry tag to the plate.
9. An accurate recipe must be submitted with each entry. If the recipe is not included, the entry will be disqualified. Recipes become the property of the Fair and may be published. Cover the recipe with plastic wrap and tape it to the bottom of the cardboard. Include exhibitor number on the recipe.
10. No more than ten entries from any individual will be accepted in this Class.
11. The same product may not be shared for entry by more than one individual. Violators (all individuals) will be disqualified.
- \*12. Decorated cakes are the only entries which will be released, all other entries become property of the Fair.

13. All entries must be made from scratch (except decorated cakes)

Non-Professional is a person who has not taught cake decorating or sold decorated cakes regularly. Due to space limitations it is best to bring cakes not before Wednesday, October 10.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. Entry numbers are followed by either a "P" to denote Professional, or by a "NP" to denote Non-Professional.
2. Designs should be chosen to adhere to category specifications. Entries that do not adhere to size limitations will be disqualified. Entries in W335NP, W340P, and W341P

may not be over 16" high and 15" in diameter, including all decorations, toppings and pillars. All other categories, including Junior Category entries, may not be over 12" high, and 16" in diameter-length, including all decorations. Measurements do not include the platter on which the cake rests.

3. Entrants are encouraged to use styrofoam to shape cakes and novelty designs. All techniques (including the shape of cake/novelty design) must be possible with real cake. Purchased items as decoration should be kept to a minimum. "Cake-shaped" above means round, square, or oblong cake shape.

4. Decorated cakes do not need to be in a plastic bag.

5. A Best of Show ribbon will be given to the best decorated cake from all categories for both Adult and Junior entries.

6. Decorated cakes, when released at the close of the Fair, **MAY NOT BE SOLD ON THE FAIRGROUNDS**, by order of the N.C. Health Department.

7. Do not send entries without first having them entered.

8. Decorated cakes must be brought to the Educational Building by 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 10.





## RULES AND REGULATIONS

The General Rules and Regulations of the Fair will govern this department. Be sure to read these rules before entering or competing in this department. Some additional rules are:

1. All entries must be made by the exhibitor, and completed since the 2000 State Fair. Any article that has been previously entered will be disqualified.
2. An exhibitor must be a North Carolina resident.
3. One entry from only one individual in a family will be allowed under one premium number.
4. Pin entry tags with safety pins—on left side of article. **Bring your own pins.**
5. Name tags must be removed from all clothing items entered.
6. Specific guidelines for all constructed wearing apparel, doll clothes, and toys: Attach pattern name and number to the back of the entry tag. If the design is original, please note on back of entry. Bring dresses, skirts, coats and suits on hangers.
7. Specific guidelines for all knitted and crocheted clothing items (excluding doll clothes and toys): Attach pattern name and number to the back of the entry stub. **All entries must be accompanied by a pattern swatch done in the same yarn as the sweater, 2" x 2" in size, with uncut edges.**
8. Quality workmanship must be evident before ribbons and awards will be given in the Clothing Construction Categories, the Knitting and Crocheting Categories, Stuffed Toy Category and Miscellaneous category.
9. Please enter your clothing articles under the appropriate category. Under each section there is a designated "other" for you to enter items that do not exactly fit. Remember it is the responsibility of the individual to enter the item correctly. Items entered incorrectly may be subject to disqualification.
10. The age categories for the Junior Division Age Category (Q, R, S, BB, CC, DD) are determined as of January 1 of the current year.

## SPECIAL INFORMATION

- "Garment" is defined broadly as a single or multiple pieces of wearing apparel (any type) that fits under the stated category.
- "Decorative Trim" is defined broadly to include any creative stitching (embroidery, french hand/machine sewing, etc.) or fabric embellishment (quilting/applique, etc.) to enhance the beauty of an item of clothing. The term "novelty" is also broadly defined to include decorative design stitches and yarns.

The Festival presents the traditional music and dance of our state as it is performed by amateurs, persons young and old, who have grown up in the rich heritage of our folk arts. Commercial, professional or secretarian performances are not appropriate.

To be eligible for prizes, performers must have proper entry forms post-marked by the closing date listed above. Properly entered contestants will have priority on the limited program time. However, the Fair welcomes impromptu performances by anyone attending the Fair subject to the restraints of time and the nature of the performance. Such persons should apply to the Superintendent in the Festival Tent.

The Fair will provide an experienced string band to accompany performers. Amplified instruments, CD's and tapes are not to be used *except with Prior approval* of the Superintendent. \*Check with Superintendent before showtime: about set-up time for instruments and equipment (very limited time available), subject to approval for tapes - be sure tapes are set at exact starting point. Please use our Band if at all possible!

Contestants should register for the Festival for one day only and should be prepared to perform at all performances on that date. Programs will be presented at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. each day during the Fair. All entries are expected for both shows on the day of their entry unless a large number of entries require the Superintendent to limit your times of performance.

Winners will be responsible for picking up their trophies at the entry department at the Fair office after they receive notification. Judging takes place at all programs and the decision of the judges is final.

Five factors are considered in scoring Festival performances: Authenticity, Audience Appeal, Appearance, Competency, and Enthusiasm. The perfect score is 100.

Winner will be notified by mail after the Fair closes.

\*There will be no "on grounds" parking for Folk Festival participants, so any instruments or equipment must be brought by hand from the parking areas.





On your entry forms the Department letter is EE. The class or premium list number is the number after the EE in each category. Please be sure to specify on top of sheet "Group A, B, or C." See "Special Entry Groups" below for explanation. Please be aware that premium numbers starting in Needlework EE37-EE76 have been changed from the 2000 premium book. **ANY ITEM ENTERED IN THE WRONG GROUP OR PREMIUM NUMBER IS SUBJECT TO DISQUALIFICATION.** Forms must be properly filled out by entry deadline or they will not be accepted.

Exhibits are eligible only if produced since the 2000 State Fair. This rule will be enforced to prevent display of materials or objects that have previously been exhibited at the State Fair. Each entry shall be in the name of one person only, and all entries must be the product of that person.

Only **ONE ENTRY UNDER ONE PREMIUM NUMBER WILL BE ALLOWED** per person. That means that under EE25, for instance, you may bring in only one item. Also, please limit number of items displayed in a set to five (as in a manger scene).

**Group "B"**—Strictly for the NON PROFESSIONAL HOBBYIST. For those engaged only as a hobbyist and not connected in any way with crafts business in that field or selling pieces. If a person is handicapped, please attach a note to this effect to item being entered.

**Group "C"**— Anyone 15 years of age and under. Age of exhibitor in this group must be clearly written on entry tag.

EE28A—Decorated Chicken Egg—Design requirements are:

- use a large, blown out chicken egg
- small end of the egg should face up
- egg should be free standing, without a base or stand (stand will be provided)

- the decorated egg has to depict North Carolina
- all decorated eggs become the property of the N.C. Egg Association and **will not be returned.**

Three prizes will be awarded for EE28A: 1st place—\$75.00, 2nd place—\$50.00, and 3rd place—\$25.00

The winning decorated egg may be sent to the White House in Washington, D.C. to represent North Carolina in the **American Egg Board Easter State Egg** display.

### WOODCARVING AND WORKING

DESIGN—For an entry to score well in design it should reveal why wood is the best material from which to construct it. Thus, the strength, direction of grain, expansion and contraction tendency, color and weathering capabilities are to be thoughtfully considered. Use of precious, fine wood is to be rewarded because it shows a commitment to your idea. Low grade wood for fine projects is less rewarded.

CRAFTSMANSHIP FIT—Tight joinery using fundamentally sound construction highly rewarded; mechanical fasteners less so.

FINISH—Complete treatment of final surfaces is to be rewarded. Sanding should be completed if begun. Finishes should be carefully applied without blemish.

**(Items From a Kit can be Entered Only in Category 50)**

- EE42—Woodworked miniature—individual items only
- EE43—Woodworked miniature (house, barn, building, etc.)
- EE44—Carving in the round (animal, fowl or figure)—machine

Jewelry has certain defining attributes that should be reflected through the entrant's design. Prize winning jewelry should show:

**Control**

Precision on a fine scale exhibits care over how the materials are manipulated, even if viewed through a magnifier. Irregularity shows lack of control. If symmetry is used, pieces should be accurately symmetrical.

**Appropriate Material**

Jewelry is made of hard substances such as ceramics, stone and metal. Materials need not be precious but should reflect the designer's knowledge of the natural tendencies of each material. Organic substances such as fibers or animal parts should be entered in other categories.

The choice of homemade beads or store-bought beads doesn't make any difference as long as the best qualities of the selection reinforce the design idea. A homemade bead by itself is not jewelry until it is incorporated into a presentation.

### Utility

Remember that jewelry is ornamental. Pieces should be useful and delicate, not too heavy to wear but strong enough to withstand the stress of moderate pulling without deforming or breaking.

It should have appropriate clasp, mechanically fastened (please, no hot glue) and situated so that the piece hangs properly when worn.

### LEATHER CRAFT

EE65—Any item (must indicate whether original idea, kit, or instruction, etc.)

### TAXIDERM Y

EE66—Mammal, fish, reptile or fowl (be sure entry is NOT endangered species).

### DECORATIVE CREATIONS

**ORIGINAL WORK ONLY**, no instructions, patterns, kits, etc., in this section.

These exhibits are for any items which do not fall into the categories listed previously.

Ceramics, wood, basketry, etc., cannot be entered here. ENTRIES ENTERED IN THIS SECTION WHICH SHOULD BE IN ANOTHER CATEGORY WILL BE DISQUALIFIED, with the exception of EE67\*, EE69\*, EE70\*, EE74\*, EE75\*, which **MUST** be entered in these categories, even though the item may be made of a material that would fit in a prior category. Wreaths, EE67\*; Christmas tree ornaments, EE69\*; Christmas decorations other than tree ornaments or Christmas stockings, EE70\*; mobiles, EE74\*; and Angels, EE75\*. Items may NOT be entered in more than one category below such as entering seashell wreaths under wreaths and nature craft. If there is a specific category for an item such as wreaths, ALL WREATHS must be entered in that category.






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
